Family and friends are invited to come and help the couple celebrate this happy event. Let your presence be your gift to them.

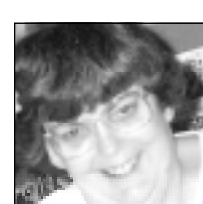
Brewster Class of '56 holds 45th reunion

Orley V. Gleason

Longtime Goodland resident Orley V. Gleason, 86, died Sunday, June 10, 2001, at the Goodland Regional Medical Center. He had been a patient there since Friday, June 8.

He was born January 20, 1915, at Florence, the son of Ola (Fitch) and O.V. Gleason. He and his family moved from Florence to Bristol, Colorado, when he was 3. He told the story many times about how long it took and he remembered traveling for 30 days by covered wagon to Bristol. He grew up in the Lamar, Colorado area, graduating from Lamar Union High School with the class of 1932.

At the age of 17, he started working for Marx Master Bakeries and later worked for numerous bakeries throughout his life: owning a bakery in Englewood, Colorado, working in a bakery in Victorville, California, and eventually buying the High Plains Bakery in Goodland. He and Frankie, his wife, bought the bakery in 1964 and ran the business for 12 years before closing it in 1976.

Many people in Goodland and surrounding communities had the privilege of eating cakes, doughnuts, and goodies for many years. After working for Great Western Sugar Company for five years, he found his way back to what he loved, which was making and decorating cakes, which he did for another ten years at his home in Goodland. He was a well-known baker, being in the business for over 60 years.

In the eyes of family, friends and others who knew him, Heaven has truly gained one of the best.

In 1935, Orley married to his first wife and from that union was born a son, Ralph. He met Theola F. "Frankie" Hosler at the Green Spot Cafe in Victorville, California, and the two moved to Lamar, Colorado.

On August 20, 1952, he and Frankie were wed in

Raton, New Mexico, and from that union were born two children, Bruce and Linda.

He was a member of the First Christian Church in Goodland, holding the position of board member and deacon, and receiving an honorary deacon emeritus pin, which he wore proudly.

He especially enjoyed his grandchildren and singing songs like "The Preacher and the Bear" and laughing with all at family gatherings.

Preceding him in death were his wife Frankie Gleason, who died on September 22, 1994; his parents; two brothers, Floyd L. Osban and Roy W. Osban; a sister, Chloe M. Osban; and a grandson, Ricky L. Gleason.

Surviving family members include son Bruce Gleason and his wife, Tina, of Goodland; daughter Linda Murray of Garden City; son Ralph Gleason and his wife, Lori, of Iowa Park, Texas; seven grandchildren, Christin Lee Gleason and Tiffany Lyn Gleason, both of Goodland; Cory Jon Murray of Garden City; PFC Jeremy Christopher Murray of Pensacola, Florida; Catherine Gleason of California; Tim Gleason of California; Melody Reyher of Comanche, Oklahoma; and three great-grandchildren.

The funeral will be Thursday, June 14, at 10:30 a.m. MT, at the First Christian Church in Goodland with Pastor Loren Strait officiating. Burial will follow in the Goodland Cemetery.

Friends may share their respects at Koons Chapel, Goodland, on Wednesday, from 3 p.m. MT until 8 p.m. MT, and at the church Thursday before the service.
