## Committee to order study; education board wants role

TOPEKA (AP) — A legislative committee plans to order a study to find the cost of providing a suitable education, and state Board of Education members want to make sure they aren’t left out of the process.

The board reviewed a measure from the recently completed legislative session, a move by the Legislative Coordinating Council to hire a firm to determine the cost of educating Kansas’ 450,000 public school students.

Legislators included the study as part of their school finance package out of concern from many officials that there was no quantitative evaluation of the state’s funding formula, the method by which government funds its

schools.

The Kansas Constitution orders the state to provide a “suitable education,” but offers little about what that means.

In ordering the study, legislators set the parameters of the state’s qualified admissions curriculum for entrance to the state’s six universities and the Board of Regents state scholarship curriculum.

Those standards include four units of English, three units of math, three units of natural science and two units of foreign language.

The study is scheduled to be completed in time for consideration during the 2002 Legislature, which begins in January.
