June 14, 1901 — A serious hailstorm occurred Sunday afternoon in the north part of the county. In some instances, the hailstones were as large

The hail seriously damaged early wheat and gave a setback to other crops. Cattle were also badly marked. Another hailstorm occurred about the same time, but struck the southeast part of the county.

On Monday, the wind was from the south and there was an appearance of rain in the southeast. A light sprinkle fell in Goodland at about 3 p.m.

Tuesday was a very disagreeable day because of a stiff wind from the south nearly all day. Then around 3 p.m., rain and hail fell south of Edson. The tremendous blow kept up until

after nightfall and a big bank of clouds gathered in the west. The storm came on late in the evening, after the lull of the south wind and rain fell quite generally over the county between 9 and From The Goodland Republic/Infor-

Smart irrigation strategies for turfgrass

here, irrigation of your lawn is becoming more of an issue. While watering helps maintain turfgrass health, proper timing and

frequency can help keep our turf in build or maintain a deep root system. good shape without sending the water

bill through the roof. The key is to water as infrequently as possible without stressing the turf. Apply enough water to wet the soil to

Sandy soils require about inch to wet a 6- to 8-inch depth, while clay soils may require an inch or more. Turf roots penetrate more deeply in sandy soil than in a compacted clay, so you may have to water turf growing in compacted clay soils more frequently than vou think. From a water conservation stand-

point, remember that as summer progresses, the purpose of watering cool-season grasses such as tall fescue is more to keep the turf alive than to not overly costly for turfgrass.

So the deep, infrequent irrigation principle that holds true in spring and fall when roots are actively growing is less important. Using less water in July and August will keep cool-season turf

alive and avoid using excess water. To conserve water, time irrigation around A good, steady rain or a heavy downpour can wet the soil sufficiently to replace a planned watering. This is particularly important for those with automatic sprinkler systems, which often can be spotted watering turf ar-
