Threat delays warship investigation

Navy investigators in Yemen looking into the bombing of the warship USS Cole were pulled out of the country because of a security threat, an FBI official said today.

"There was a specific and credible threat that called for removal from the country," said FBI spokesman Bill Carter. The investigation teams were pulled out Sunday.

President Bush, speaking to reporters before meeting with Secretary of State Colin Powell, declined comment. "Once we finish our investigation, our government would be willing to discuss that," he said.

The move follows a June 9 State Department warning of an increased threat of terrorism against Americans and U.S. interests in Yemen. The de-
