More gorings prompt fence around buffalo

HAYS (AP) — About 15 signs warn visitors to keep their distance from the city-owned herd of buffalo penned near West Frontier Park. That's roughly one sign for each buffalo.

Nevertheless, three people have been gored since early April while standing near the fence, and city officials have taken steps to put more distance between the horned animals and curious humans.

A barbed wire fence has been installed inside the pen. The work began just hours after a Lawrence boy was injured Friday evening and was finished Monday.

"That's to keep the buffalo away from the people, since we can't seem to keep the people away from the buffalo," said Jeff Boyle, city park director.

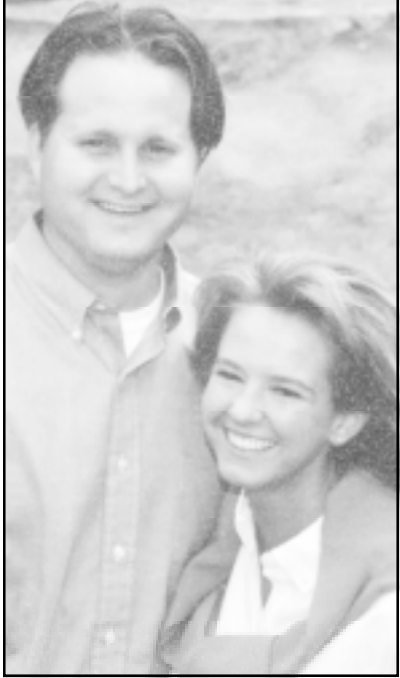
