June 22, 1901 — The first westbound train of the new Rocky Mountain Limited passed through Goodland on Monday. It was six minutes late on account of a heavy wind. It was composed of five cars, a diner, chair car and two Pullmans, Celtic and Meltonia, and a combination baggage and smoker. The eastbound service was inaugurated Tuesday. The train had 100 paying passengers Wednesday. A passenger had an epileptic fit Wednesday afternoon while the train was in Goodland. The man fell down in the vestibule. Conductor Wickersham dosed him with common salts and the patient recovered immediately.




