today in history

June 22, 1901 — The first west-bound train of the new Rocky Mountain Limited passed through Goodland on Monday. It was six minutes late on account of a heavy wind. It was composed of five cars, a diner, chair car and two Pullmans, Celtic and Meltonia, and a combination baggage and smoker. The eastbound service was inaugurated Tuesday. The train had 100 paying passengers Wednesday. A passenger had an epileptic fit Wednesday afternoon while the train was in Goodland. The man fell down in the vestibule. Conductor Wickersham dosed him with common salts and the patient recovered immediately.

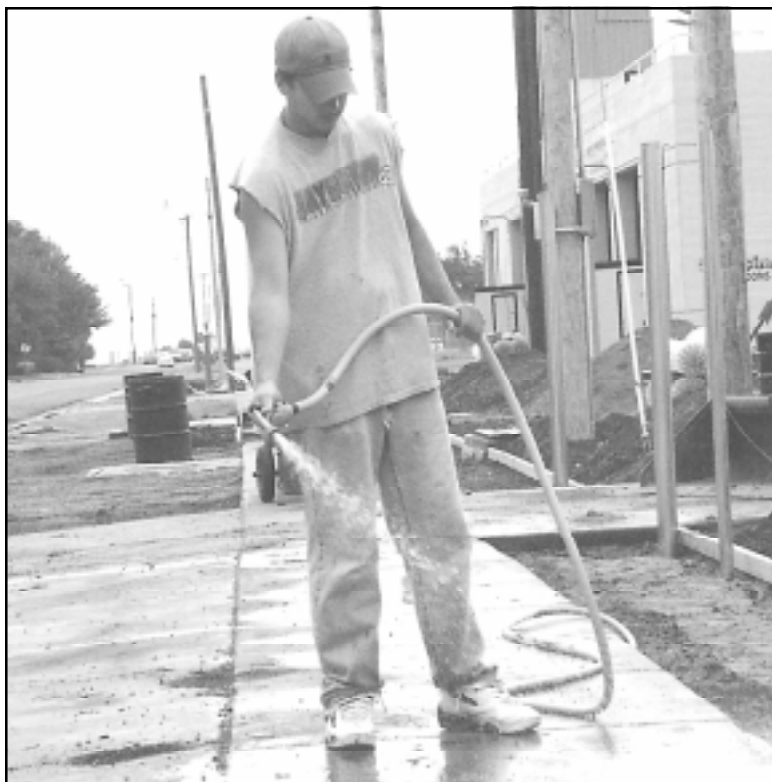

Home care business expands

Jill's Helping Hands, an in-home care provider based in Edmond, is opening a branch in Goodland serving the six western-most northwest Kansas counties and offering house cleaning, meal preparation, grooming and other services.

Owner Jill Edgett, from Edmond, said she started the business 4 1/2 years ago and now has over 100 clients in northwest Kansas and 40 employees. The demand for in-home care services in the Goodland area is so great, she said, that a branch office is necessary.

Goodland's Tami Sanderson has been hired to manage the branch at 915 Cherry Ave., and Edgett said she wants to find six to eight employees to help the elderly or others who want to live in their home but can't do the housework.

"Our job is to find dependable workers that live within the community we serve," she said.

With the motto of "a helping hand at home," the business' employees will do

everything from shopping, laundry and life management (bill paying, paperwork) to bathing, transferring and mobility for clients.

Edgett said state- and federally-funded programs, home- and community-based services and the Area Agency on Aging will help those who qualify pay for the services. However, she noted, Helping Hands also offers services to those who don't qualify for an assistance program.

Sanderson said though the office, which opened last week, is still needing employees, she is taking referrals and making appointments. The office should be fully functional by July, she said.

Sanderson said she was considering opening a similar business on her own, but instead decided to take Jill's offer to manage a branch here.

A Goodland man picked up \$100 for collecting litter along Main Street. He found a certificate worth \$100 that is part of *Country* magazine's third annual "Great Country Cleanup" campaign.

He feels that it is appropriate that *Country* magazine help with the cleanup of rural America, the area celebrated in their magazine.

Country magazine is known for having a "needle in a haystack" drawing in each issue to "puzzle" readers. This time, though, the needle is hidden along rural roads across the United

States. Each biodegradable plastic packet contains a plastic "needle in a haystack" and a note stating, "Hay, you found it!" along with details to collect the prize. Each packet is coded to allow prizes to be accurately awarded.

Searchers need not be subscribers to the company's magazines to win. Anyone of any age is eligible, except relatives of the field editors. Searchers are urged to take along a garbage bag to pick up litter while they look.
