# Wildcat’s denied early game

MANHATTAN (AP) — Kansas State and Southern Methodist will not meet in the Black Coaches Association Classic on Aug. 25, both schools said Monday.

The schools had agreed to meet in the game in Manhattan, Kan., but both said the deal with the BCA and the Gazelle Group, the game’s promoter, fell apart over the last few days.

“We are disappointed that we won’t be playing in this game,” said Kansas State senior associate athletic director Jim Epps.

“As recently as Friday of last week, we felt we had an agreement in principle to play in the game.”

Messages left with the BCA and the Gazelle Group by The Associated Press on Monday were not returned.

“We were pleased to be considered for the BCA game, but we are sorry that the final details couldn’t be worked out,” SMU athletic director Jim Copeland said.

“The national exposure would have been great for the program, but unfortunately, we couldn’t come to a final agreement.”

Kansas State was ninth in the final AP poll last season with an 11-3 record, while SMU finished 3-9.

Apparently one of the sticking points in the negotiations was television.

Kansas State said the game was going to be televised regionally on Fox Sports Network.

It would have been the second straight year Kansas State played in a preseason game. Last year the Wildcats beat Iowa 27-7 in the Eddie Robinson Classic at Arrowhead Stadium.

Epps said it was unclear if Kansas State not playing in the BCA Classic was a final decision.

“Since these negotiations have been so difficult and involved,” Epps said, “it is certainly in our best interests to keep all our options open should negotiations take another turn.”

# Wimbledon play opens with upset

WIMBLEDON, England (AP) — Martina Hingis didn’t expect to join the growing list of injured leading women on the Wimbledon sidelines.

She got there anyway with a stunning opening-day loss.

The world’s top-ranked player tried to fight through pain in her lower back, but endured the disappointment of a straight-set setback Monday to the 83rd-ranked player.

That 6-4, 6-2 loss to Virginia Ruano Pascual of Spain removed a huge obstacle to Jennifer Capriati’s bid for the Grand Slam.

Capriati already has won the Australian and French Opens. Monica Seles, Mary Pierce or Anna Kournikova never made it to Wimbledon because of injuries.

Capriati, seeded fourth, beat Maria Alejandra Vento of Venezuela 6-3, 6-

2, winning nine straight games in one stretch. And No. 5 Williams barely worked up a sweat in her 40-minute match, a 6-1, 6-0 victory over Rita Kuti Kis of Hungary.

Top-seeded Pete Sampras has felt at home on the Wimbledon grass for the last eight tournaments. He won seven of them and took a stride toward a record eighth title and fifth straight by winning his 29th straight match.

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# Padres pound Rockies at home

DENVER (AP)—Mark Kotsay had the most assists by any outfielder in baseball in his first three major league seasons.

He recorded only his second assist of the season Monday night, but it was huge.

Kotsay’s diving catch and throw to second to double up Juan Pierre thwarted Colorado’s eighth-inning rally, helping preserve San Diego’s 6-4 victory.

“They came back at us, and Kotsay saved us with a great catch,” Padres manager Bruce Bochy said.

The Rockies, trailing 5-3 after Ben Davis hit a two-run homer in the top of the eighth, rallied as Pierre walked and Neifi Perez singled off Jose Nunez with no outs.

But Larry Walker struck out, and Kotsay, who had 53 assists the last three years, made a diving catch of Todd Helton’s sinking ball in short center field, then scrambled to his feet and threw out Pierre at second.

Rockies manager Buddy Bell was ejected by second-base umpire Jim Reynolds for arguing the call.

“From where I sat, I thought he got back in time,” Bell said.

Kotsay’s defensive play helped Kevin Jarvis beat his old team and extend San Diego’s winning streak to four games.

Davis’ seventh homer, off Gabe White (1-5), broke a 3-3 tie. It followed a one-out walk to Mike Darr, who then stole second.

Earlier this month, Davis enjoyed a career highlight, homering off Randy Johnson. Asked which homer was more satisfying, Davis didn’t hesitate.

“The one tonight,” he said. “We were down 4-0 when I hit the one off Randy. The one tonight put us ahead.

“I was just trying to do anything I could to get the run in from second. The pitch was down and in, but I was able to get the barrel of the bat on it. I got

lucky and hit it out.”

Jarvis (4-7), 0-3 in his previous four starts, pitched seven strong innings, allowing six hits and three runs with no walks and three strikeouts. He had been 0-5 on the road this season.

“I knew I hadn’t gotten a road win, but I didn’t dwell on it,” Jarvis said. “I can’t be concerned whether it is home or away. I have to get our club wins.”

“I gave up a couple of home runs, but after the homers I was able to get the next out and get back into a rhythm.”

Todd Walker went 4-for-4 with two homers and two doubles for Colorado. Larry Walker also homered for the Rockies, who have lost seven of eight.

Trevor Hoffman pitched the ninth for his 16th save.

Rockies starter Shawn Chacon went six innings, allowing three hits and three runs, leaving with the score tied 3-3.

“Shawn settled down after the third inning and gave us a chance to win,” Bell said. “I thought Jarvis pitched very well. He didn’t walk anybody. We had some opportunities, but not enough.”

White, the Rockies’ top pitcher last year after going 11-2 with a 2.17 ERA, continued to struggle. His ERA ballooned to 8.81.

He gave up the homer to Davis on a 1-2 pitch.

“For whatever reason, he’s having a hard time putting a hitter away,” Bell said.

Notes: With the Rockies’ recall of C Adam Melhuse from Triple-A Colorado Springs, RHP Justin Speier was designated for assignment. ... Jarvis went 3-4 with a 5.95 ERA last season for the Rockies. ... San Diego SS D’Angelo Jimenez, acquired from the New York Yankees on Saturday, got his first National League hit, a single in the seventh. ... Dating to 1999, San Diego has won nine of 11 games at Coors Field.
