TOPEKA(AP)—He's coy about served as secretary of commerce and

Sherrer plans to announce Friday whether he'll run next year for the Republican nomination for governor.

Sherrer scheduled a news conference for 10:30 a.m. Friday in his Statehouse office. The two-sentence statement from his office gave no further details, and Sherrer wouldn't disclose his

plans during an interview Tuesday, though he did say he has made up his mind.

"I haven't taken any of this lightly," he said. "It has consumed a lot of my time, my thinking time. I've had input from a lot of people.'

Sherrer, 60, has served as lieutenant governor since May 1996, and his tenure is the longest ever. He also has

his intentions now, but Lt. Gov. Gary housing since Gov. Bill Graves took

office in January 1995. Graves is serving his second four-year term, and the Kansas Constitution prevents him from running for re-election next year. Like Graves, Sherrer considers himself a moderate.

Others listed as potential Republican candidates are U.S. Reps. Jerry Moran and Todd Tiahrt, State Treasurer

Tim Shallenburger, Kansas House Speaker Kent Glasscock and state GOP Chairman Mark Parkinson.

During an appearance Monday in Wakefield, Moran told KJCK radio he was seriously considering entering the race but had made no final decision. He declined to say when he might announce a decision.

"I'm looking at it seriously and

trying to listen to Kansans as to where I best can serve, trying to figure out in my own mind what my goals would be as governor, and do I have the skills and abilities to make a difference in this state?," Moran said.

One Republican candidate, former Junction City Mayor Lloyd Parker, already has declared.

Among Democrats, Insurance Commissioner Kathleen Sebelius is considered the front-runner for the party's nomination.

Over the past two decades, candidates for statewide office typically have announced their intentions and kicked off their campaigns with a series of rallies across the state. But Sherrer said people shouldn't read too much into the fact that he's scheduled only a single news conference.

"The last thing I'd want to be, if I were a candidate, is a conventional one," Sherrer said.

Kansas farmers plant biggest soybean crop


WICHITA (AP) — Kansas farmers have planted more soybeans this spring than at any other time in the state's history, Kansas Agricultural Statistics Service said.

Soybean plantings in the state totaled 3 million acres, the agency said in its recently released June acreage report. That is 2 percent above last year's planting.

The increase in soybean plantings comes at the same time that corn acres are down in the state.

Kansas farmers ended up sowing 3.3 million acres to corn — 4 percent fewer acres than last year. About 38 percent of the corn planted in the state was genetically modified varieties.

Driving the crop choices are high prices for such things as the natural gas that powers irrigation pumps and produces nitrogen fertilizers, and the diesel gas to fuel tractors.
