By the time a student reaches the eighth grade, one in five of his or her peers will have used inhalants to get high.

Many young people will become chronic users and require treatment and chemical dependence therapy. Unfortunately, demand for facilities that treat solvent addiction greatly outweighs supply. Chronic inhalant users can and do slip through the cracks.

Why have inhalant abusers become a "throw-away" population? Few facilities have experience in treating the compounded medical, neurological and psychological disorders associated with chronic huffers. Furthermore, inhalant abuse is a problem that is largely undertreated by the managed care industry, understudied by the substance abuse field and overlooked by parents.

Chronic users do not fit the mold of most drug abuse populations, says Mark Groves, director of the Minneapolis-based Eden Youth Inhalant Abuse and Information Training Project and author of Preventing Inhalant Abuse: A Training Manual. Users are younger, often delinquent, and can suffer a multitude of medical, psychological and social dysfunction brought on by the chemicals they have sniffed or huffed.

'Because of the damage neurotoxic chemicals cause to the brain," Groves said, "I think it is wise to consider the regular, chronic inhalant abuser as having a mental health problem rather than a chemical dependency problem."

damage from inhalant use is reversible, the process of breaking the chemical dependency and treating the physical and psychological ill-effects of inhalant use takes considerable time. The typical 28-day stay allotted by insurance companies for treatment is inadequate. Experts say it may take at least that amount of time just to get the user ready to engage in therapy.

"Because neurotoxins are stored in the fatty tissue of the body, the inhalant abuser may experience residual effects for sometime." Groves said. "This could include affect and dullness of intellectual functioning.'

Detoxification can take 20 to 30 days and often times much longer. After that, users need either residential treatment or extensive outpatient therapy, often over a year of services and counseling. Insurance companies, however, generally cover just 3 to 5 days of crisis stabilization in a residential setting and approximately 20 days of followup outpatient services. While some enter treatment often do so through health care providers offer lengthier court directed programs. Accordingly, terms of stay, few provide coverage of the long-term patient and family abuse-can become the main focus of therapy that is necessary to rehabilitate the therapy.

not do well in a While much of the neurological group therapy setting. Their thinking and concentration skills are greatly diminished by the damage of substance abuse. Experts recommend that inhalers be treated separately.

Those individuals who do not have the insurance to cover residential treatment still face many obstacles in finding facilities. To begin with, inhalant awareness among parents is almost non-existent. AU.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission study showed that more than 95 percent of parents believe their child has never tried inhalants, compared with national statistics that show one in five or 21.2 percent of eighth graders have used solvents in his or her lifetime.

If parents do discover their child is a chronic huffer, it is difficult to find a treatment facility that has the expertise necessary to break the cycle of addiction. Many treatment facilities do not accept inhalant users, while others put them through treatment modalities that are not suited for their needs. Users that delinquent behavior - not inhalant
