

Goodland wins doubleheader

Earlier in the season, Goodland's American Legion baseball club would let a bad inning become a bad game and would lose.

But not Saturday night. Goodland shook off their defensive lapses and enjoyed timely hitting. Their good play gave the black and gold their first doubleheader sweep of the season. They handed visiting Calhan, Colo., two losses, 5-4 and 3-2. Goodland had to come from behind in both games.

Defensive lapses gave Calhan their first two runs of the night, when Calhan's Nolan Payne and Mike Shook both scored on Goodland errors. Calhan was up 2-0 in the third.

Justin Jamison opened the Goodland fourth with a double. His courtesy runner, Kyle Schulte, came home on Michael Pickett's sacrifice fly, making it 2-1, Calhan.

Calhan answered in the fifth. Nick Henry opened the inning with a double to left, later scoring on an error. Shook reached first on another error. He scored on Seth Renneker's double, giving Calhan a 3-1 lead.

Goodland then used Calhan's errors to tie the game at 3.

Kyle Whisler led off the Goodland fifth with a walk. Two outs later, Aaron Gittinger walked. Both scored on an error. P.J. Crumbaker then got to first

on an error, scoring on another. Calhan was held scoreless in the sixth and seventh, while Goodland got just one hit.

But what a hit. With one out and no one on, Pickett put the ball over the fence in left center for the eventual winning run.

In the second game, Calhan opened with four straight walks. One base runner was picked off by pitcher P.J. Crumbaker and the other was a victim of Kevin Schulte's force play at second. Crumbaker escaped the jam with just one run allowed.

Goodland got on the board in the second, when Pickett led off with a triple to left. He later scored on a wild pitch.

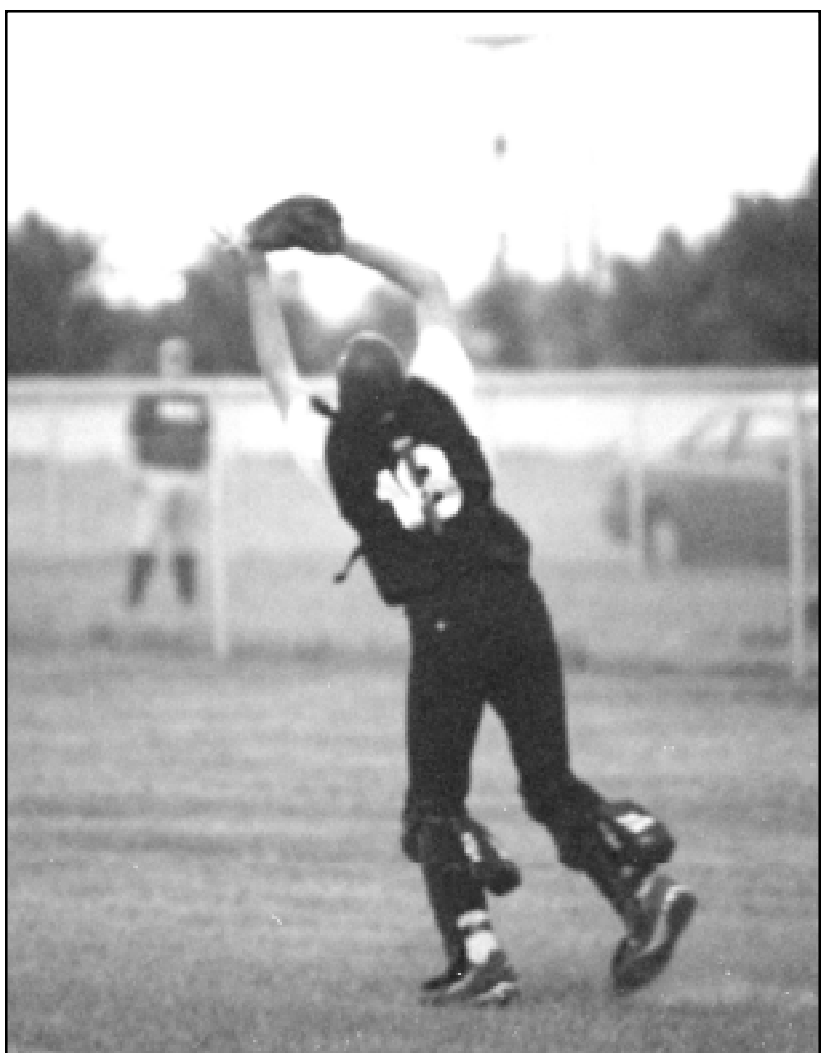
With two out in the inning, Whisler walked. He then stole second and third, scoring on an error. Goodland led 2-1.

Calhan tied the game in the third on Rennaker's two-out solo homer.

The score stayed tied until the bottom of the fifth and final inning. Kyle Schulte walked to start the Goodland half of the inning and was sacrificed to second on Gittinger's bunt.

Crumbaker singled, bringing Schulte to third. Jamison singled to right to bring in Schulte and win the game.

Landon West was Goodland's winning pitcher in the first game and Crumbaker picked up the win in the

second. Both were complete game victories.

In the first game, catcher Jamison recorded three put-outs by catching foul balls. Brandon Linden and Donald Raymer both recorded beautiful diving

catches in the outfield, Linden in the first game, Raymer in the second.

Rockies win big over Texas 11-2

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) — Shawn Chacon recovered from his worst outing in the majors by allowing two runs over eight-plus innings, and Larry Walker hit three doubles as Colorado stopped a five-game slide by beating the Texas Rangers 11-2 Saturday.

Chacon (5-5), a rookie who had lost three of his previous four decisions, allowed seven hits, struck out six and walked three. He carried a four-hit shutout into the ninth inning, before giving up three straight hits.

In Chacon's previous start, on July 8, he tied Rockies club records by allowing 11 runs and five homers over five innings in an 11-3 loss to the Anaheim Angels.

Colorado's Juan Pierre went 4-for-4, tying a club record with two triples, and drove in three runs, while Ben Petrick also had three RBIs.

Chacon retired the first 10 Rangers before Mike Lamb walked and Alex Rodriguez followed with a single in the fourth inning.

Rangers starter Doug Davis (4-7) allowed four runs and nine hits over six innings. He struck out five and walked one.

Both teams were drained by the 96-degree heat during a rare July afternoon home game for the Rangers. It started 2 1/2 hours earlier than normal because the Rockies play a day game

at Oakland on Sunday. The Rockies scored a run in the first on Walker's double, but could have had more. Colorado later loaded the bases with one out, but Cliff Brumbaugh grounded into a force play at the plate, and Petrick grounded out.

Colorado made it 2-0 in the fifth when Pierre tripled and scored on Kim Barteel's sacrifice fly. The Rockies extended their lead to 4-0 the next inning on Petrick's RBI single and Pierre's sacrifice fly.

Colorado had a five-run seventh off reliever Aaron Myette. Jeff Cirillo had an RBI single, Petrick hit a two-run double, Brent Butler had an RBI double, and Pierre added an RBI single.

In the ninth, Greg Norton's solo homer and Pierre's RBI triple made it 11-0 for Colorado.

Gabe Kapler hit a two-run double in the ninth for Texas.

Notes: Rockies 1B Todd Helton missed his second straight start with a strained right hamstring. Colorado had lost 10 of its last 11 games and 18 of 21. Rockies third-base coach Rich Donnelly was hit in the back of the head by a foul liner off the bat of Norton in the third inning. Donnelly fell to the ground and was down for about 30 seconds, but got to his feet and remained in the game.

Wrigley expansion faces fight

CHICAGO (AP) — Perhaps nowhere in baseball does tradition run deeper than at Wrigley Field, where a battle against expansion is being fought from — and over — the rooftops.

Fans watching Chicago Cubs games in seats on roofs across the street from the ivy-covered park are a familiar sight to television viewers around the country. Once those fans were local residents in lawn chairs, a beer in one hand and a bratwurst in the other, but today the rooftops are controlled by

business people who charge as much as \$100 a head.

The Cubs face a battle over their plan to expand the 39,059-seat jewel of a park on several fronts, but their proposal to raise the height of the bleachers would cut into the view from the roofs — and cost some serious money to those business people who have invested in their informal skyboxes.

"You used to see Harry Caray panning the rooftops," said Bernard Hansen, the alderman whose ward includes Wrigley. "It was like the ivy."
