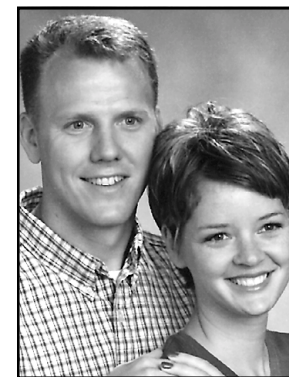
Dahl's to mark 40th anniversary

Farmers must report land purchases and sales

The Sherman County Farm Service Agency office reminds producers who have sold land, purchased land, changed the title on land, acquired land through leases or terminated a lease to report these changes to the office.

All changes are to be reported by 30 days of the occurrence or Aug. 1, whichever is earlier, in order for the change to be effective for the current crop year.

In some instances, changes have occurred such as, spouses are listed on deeds of ownership as either a joint tenant or a tenant in common or trusts, partnerships, joint ventures or corpo-

rations have been formed. Other changes have occurred due to estate planning.

The farm service records must reflect all operator or ownership changes. If a farmer fails to maintain accurate records with the office on all land the farmer has an interest in, it can lead to program eligibility and fines.

Request for reconstitutions must be initiated by June 1 to still be effective for the current year. A signature by at least one producer on the farm must be obtained on the production flexibility contract within 30 days after notification that the reconstitution has been

completed.

The final date for participants to provide all necessary signatures and related documents is Aug. 1 to be eligible for payments for 2001. Documents received by mail must be post-marked no later than Aug. 1. The related documents include AD-1026, CCC-502 and any other document necessary for the producer to be eligible for payments.
