Flatlander Race raises money in Goodland

The Goodland Daily News Part one of Goodland's 24th annual Flatlander 5 Race Series brought in \$315 for the Muscular Dystrophy Association on Saturday morning, with runners coming from as far away as Iowa and Missouri to compete.

said the first part of the event, held at the Goodland Activities Center each year, usually brings in about \$650 for the association, but racers didn't raise as much money this year.

The number of racers competing this year was typical, he said, but fewer young runners, who usually raise the most money, participated. A total of 19 runners came out, but only a few were under 18 and only two ran in the 1/2mile kid's fun run, including an 11month-old who finished most of the course in his father's arms.

"We just didn't have the number of kids come out that we usually have," Schwasinger said, noting that more high school students usually participate.

"Nobody went out and collected money," he added. "It happens every once in a while."

Schwasinger said the money will be used to help children in the area with muscular dystrophy, a chronic disease that eats away at a person's muscles. He said part two of the race, which will be held on the last Saturday in September, will most likely raise about \$600 for the association.

annual Flatlander's celebration, which will be held downtown that weekend. He said that race is usually a big money maker.

After the race Saturday, Schwasinger handed out ribbons and trophies to the runners at the activities center. While no one broke previous Rich Schwasinger, race organizer, records, Reece Tedford of Goodland came within five seconds of breaking the record in the men's 5K race, set by Jeff Becker of Goodland in 1996.

> Tedford, the overall men's 5K winner, finished the race in 17 minutes and 35 seconds.

In the 18 and under category, Daniel Blake, Goodland, finished in 24 minutes, 40 seconds. In the 19 to 39 category, Grady Bonsall, Goodland, finished in 25 minutes, 10 seconds. Michael Skipper, Goodland, came out on top in the 40 to 49 category with a time of 18 minutes, 50 seconds; followed by Raymond Texter, Wray, Colo., 20 minutes, 41 seconds; Jerry Schock, St. Francis, 20:59; Ron Garrett, Peculiar, Mo., 24:43; and Schwasinger, 27:37. Mike Mersch, Goodland, came in first in the 50 and over category with a time of 24 minutes, 3 seconds, followed by Ron Beeson, Kanorado, 27 minutes, 21 seconds.

Sara Parsons of Leon, Iowa, a friend of Tedford's, was the only woman to participate in the women's 5K race, finishing in 24 minutes and 32 seconds. The record of 21 minutes, 20 seconds was set by Julie Rus of Eckley, Colo.
