# Kanorado native exhibits art

Artist Cally Krallman, a Kanorado native who now lives in Topeka, will have her landscape paintings on dis-play at the Carnegie Arts Center this weekend as part of the Sherman County High School Alumni show.

Krallman's paintings went up today and will be on display through the end of August. The opening reception is Sun-day from 1 to 3 p.m. at the art center and people can meet Krallman, formerly Cally Kirby, at the event, sponsored by the Vignery and Mason law firm.  
Krallman, who graduated from Goodland High School in 1977, said being raised on a farm gave her a sense of the outdoors and she tries to capture the essence of the Kansas landscape in her paintings.

"I feel the Kansas landscape really has a lot to offer the artist," she said.  
Krallman attended Hillside School, one of the last one-room rural schools in Kansas, and earned a Bachelor of Fine Arts degree from Washburn Uni-versity in Topeka in 1981.

Her parents are Darlene Kirby, who lives north of Kanorado, and the late Allen Kirby. She and her husband Mike live in Topeka.

Krallman said her aunt, Ruth Mayer, has always been her biggest inspira-tion. Mayer, who now lives in Kirks-ville, Mo., is also exhibiting her art work in the center's alumni show.

Krallman said she loves to try to cap-ture the vastness of the Kansas Plains. She said she often travels the back roads to photograph and paint the land-scape, bringing the simplicity to life in her work.

Krallman said when she first began painting, she used watercolors, but she soon began experimenting with acrylic, finding that it was much more compat-ible to her loose, impressionistic style.

She said she calls herself a "scumbler" because she allows the paint to skim across the surface of the canvass. This allows a "blended" ef-fect, she said, similar to using oil paint.

Krallman is involved in community art activities and has started several children's arts programs in Topeka. She has served on the board of the Topeka School Fund and Topeka Art Guild.

She works full-time as an account executive and graphic artist for Posi-tive Impressions, a company special-izing in screen printed and embroi-dered clothing.

Krallman said she finds switching from painting to screen printing a chal-lenge.

"I am able to use the abstraction qualities of one medium to create a unique style in the other," she said. "I love them both."

She said commissioned works are her real specialty.

"I feel a great sense of achievement when working with people to get a

painting for their home or business that they love," she said.

Krallman said she takes time to know the prospective recipient to meet their needs, while maintaining the style and vision of her work.

"I have the opportunity to meet many wonderful people through this process as well," she said. "People know my style, and so they already have a feel for the type of work they are commissioning."


She has been featured in one-person shows, including the Eva Reynolds Gallery in Kansas City, Mo.; Carnegie

Cultural Arts Center of Ottawa; Roy's Gallery, Lawrence; Beauchamp Gal-lery, Topeka; and Framewoods of To-peka; and is exhibiting a solo show at the Birger Sandzen Museum and Gal-lery in Lindsborg through September.

Her work has been selected in many juried shows, including Corporate Woods' "Art in the Wood" and the Kansas Triennial, a three-year show traveling the state, sponsored by the Kansas Arts Commission and Mulvane Art Museum.

Her work is in many private and cor-porate collections.


