An early 20th Century love letter

The following is from The Goodland Republic/Information, provided by The Sherman County Historical Society.

Aug 19, 1901 - A 20th CENTURY LOVE LETTER: The following letter, which, it is claimed, was picked up on the streets of Goodland, was handed to *The Republic* for publication. It is evidently a sample of a love letter of the century’s style and one perhaps be used to an advantage by some young people who are not well versed in the art of love letter writing:

My Dear Mr. B_: Every time I think of you, my hart jumps up and down like a churm-dasher; sensations of exquisite joy caper over it like young goats on a stable roof. As a gosling swimmeth with delight in a mud puddle, so swim I in a sea of glory. Visions of ecstatic rapture, thicker than the hairs of a blacking brush, visit me in slumbers, and borne to me on invisible wings. Your image stands before me, and I reach out to grasp it like a pointer snapping at a blue bottle fly. When I ponder upon your angelic perfection’s, I am bewildered, and my brain whirls around like a bumble bee under a glass tumbler, and I lift up mine ears to hear the silvery accents of your dear voice. Day and night you are in my thoughts. When the jay birds pipe their tuneful lay in the rose bush by the back door steps; when the striking of the old town clock heralds the coming morn; when the awakening pig rises from his bed and grunteth and goeth forth to seek his morning refreshments, I think of thee, and like a piece of gum elastic my heart seems stretched clear across by bosom. Your eyes are glorious to behold, and in their liquid depths, I see legions of little cupids, bathing like cohort of ants in an old army cracker. Your nose is from a chunk of Parisian marble, and your mouth is puckered with sweetness; your laugh lingers in my ears like the bleat of a stray lamb on a bleak hill side, and the dimples in you cheeks are like hollows in cakes of home made

Build your child’s self-confidence to help them resist drug abuse

Help your child develop self-confidence and self-respect. Praise them when they do something good. This could be something as simple as doing a chore around the house without being asked, or bringing home good grades. Also, give them responsibilities. This shows your trust in them.

Kids that feel good about themselves have the inner strength to resist peer pressure.

Get to know your child’s friends and their parents. You don’t have to spy, only show your genuine concern and interest. If you are concerned about the selection of new friends, talk with your child about it. Find out what these friends have to offer. What is it about them that your child finds interesting and why?

Find out what is the reach of drug use in the schools and community. Then you can find out what local groups or organizations are doing to fight this problem, and join them.

Use peer pressure in your favor. Encourage your child to join other kids in forming a group/team or join one

which is already in place, that encourages and provides positive and healthy activities. These could include a variety of activities such as sports, art classes, camp, field trips and more.

Help your child learn how to make family decisions, including them in the planning of a family reunion, an activity or vacation. The practice of making these decisions will give them some authority and will help them feel more in control of their lives.

Work with your children so that they can understand the difference between reality and make believe on television, music, magazines and/or commercials when it comes to drug use. Don’t underestimate the likes in music or television your children have. Instead, find out what their likes and dislikes are and why. Then find out if those messages are positive or negative. Fort Riley is getting ready for a show to air on Fox

FORT RILEY (AP) — Fort Riley is getting ready to take to the air waves with a weekly news program to be broadcast on a network-affiliated television station.

The show, “In Step with Fort Riley,” will air Saturday mornings over KTMJ-TV, a Fox Network station.

“We’re the 16th-largest city in the state. We want everybody to understand what Fort Riley is and what we

do,” said Gary Skidmore, the post’s command information officer and coordinator of the television effort.

“Everybody hears what I call the sounds of freedom out on the artillery range, but not everybody really knows what we do. People are going to have a better understanding of what Fort Riley and the United States Army are doing here.”

Dave Waters, vice president and

general manager of Fox 43, said Fort Riley officials approached his station about using the studio in Junction City.

The show will kick off with seven minutes of locally produced news about Fort Riley, followed by a segment of world news focusing on the Army and Defense Department. After that, a two-minute segment on veterans’ benefits will be a staple.

The first show is set to air Oct. 6.
