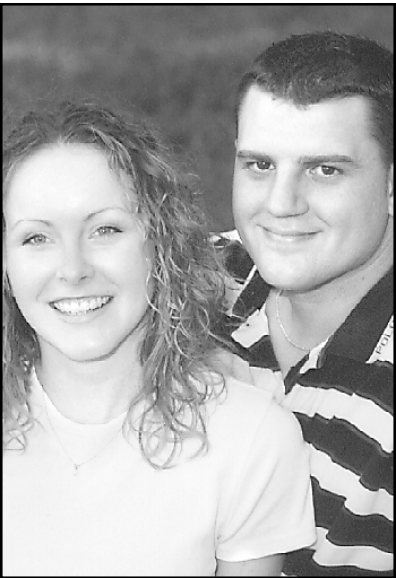
Couple plans wedding Sept. 1 in Manhattan

Historic Kansas maps are now available online

WICHITA (AP)—Sure, they're no good for directions. But the old Kansas maps recently put online by Wichita State University are a gold mine for historians.

School officials say they believe the collection of more than 325 historic maps is among the largest online.

The maps date from 1556 to 1900, showing the changing boundaries of Kansas and the routes of explorers, railroads, roads and trails. They also show the clash of cultures, topographic details and the decorative borders and elaborate touches typical of early day mapmakers.

"This is dynamic as a historical document," said Mike Kelly, curator of special collections at WSU's Ablah Library. "It shows how the state went

through many booms and busts. And there are many examples of towns that sprung up one year and disappeared the next."

Kansas historians say the collection is a valuable resource.

"You can find more information from a historical map than just locations and places," said Virgil Dean, historian at the Kansas State Historical Society in Topeka.

With the click of a computer mouse, you can see a 17th-century Kansas with international boundaries set by Spain and France.

Another click, and you can travel to the 19th century and see Indian Territory divided into specific tribal reservations, or zoom in on rivers and streams, county seats and roadways.
