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### Historic Kansas maps are now available online

good for directions. But the old Kansas maps recently put online by Wichita State University are a gold mine for historians.

School officials say they believe the collection of more than 325 historic maps is among the largest online.

The maps date from 1556 to 1900, showing the changing boundaries of Kansas and the routes of explorers, railroads, roads and trails. They also show the clash of cultures, topographic details and the decorative borders and elaborate touches typical of early day mapmakers.

"This is dynamic as a historical special collections at WSU's Ablah

Kansas historians say the collection is a valuable resource.
