State regulations are tough on temporary housing for animals

WICHITA (AP) — Two or three times a week, Ellen Querner visits the Wichita Animal Shelter in search of unclaimed pets to place in foster homes until permanent adoptive homes can be found.

Querner, director of PALS Animal Rescue, estimated she has saved 300 animals so far this year.

But new regulations will make it harder to find foster homes for pets, and will place an unfair burden on rescue organizations, she said. She fears that will lead to more animals being killed in shelters.

The Kansas Animal Health Department drafted temporary regulations May 31 in response to an attorney general's opinion on the Kansas Pet Animal Act, which regulates animal shelters and pounds. A public hearing will be held this fall before permanent regulations are adopted.

The draft rules require foster homes — people providing temporary care

and housing for pets — to be licensed, inspected and affiliated with a state-licensed shelter. They also limit the kinds of animals foster homes can take in and how long they can keep them.

The proposed regulations state that foster homes cannot directly accept stray or relinquished animals but must take them to a shelter.

That does not mean the state is going to go after "good Samaritans" who give a stray a temporary home, said Debra Duncan, director of the animal facilities inspection program for the Kansas Animal Health Department.

"The whole purpose of the stray law is for people to be able to recover their lost pets," she said. If the pets are in a private home, the owners have little chance of finding them.

Querner contended a pet should not be taken to a shelter because of the stressful atmosphere, chance of disease and probability of being euthanized.

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
