# College president looks forward to year

as companies are cutting back to survive.  
“We try to train the number of students that the industry needs,” he said, noting that this year there will likely be more graduates than some industries can use. A year ago, many companies couldn’t get enough young, skilled workers.  
All college administrators and instructors can do, Clouse said, is encourage students to be smart about their education and make themselves as marketable as possible.  
“We’re trying to instill in our students a good work ethic,” he said, noting that many instructors treat the classroom environment more like a work environment, expecting from students what would be expected from an employee.  
“We teach them how to write a resume,” Clouse said, “how to interview. It’s more of a holistic approach.”  
As the communications field continues to grow and computer technology develops, he said, things will start looking up for technical college students.

“Give us six to 12 months,” he said, “and things are going to pick up. The communication industry is going to do nothing but grow.”  
Clouse said as cars and other machinery continue to become more computer-controlled and sophisticated, there will always be a need for skilled technicians.  
“There are a lot of positives out there,” he said, adding that he’s not too worried about the future.  
“I’m concerned,” he said, “but I’m not going into crisis mode.”  
What he is looking forward to, he said, is a successful and productive year.  
“We will strive to have the best year ever,” Clouse said, noting that administrators are working to fill a demand for student housing and bring in more women, who now make up 20 percent of the student population.  
Richard Hoffman, who has been assistant president for about four years, said he likes Clouse’s ideas and attitude, as do the staff and instructors.  
“It’s a fresh approach,” he said. “He’s excited about being here and that transfers to the rest of the staff.”  
Hoffman added that he and Clouse

work well together.  
“Oh, very well,” he said. “Mr. Clouse and I have a great deal of respect for each other.”

Clouse said it was Hoffman’s idea to put bunk beds in some of the student housing rooms, increasing the number of beds available from 44 to about 55. He said part of the college’s strategic plan will be to further evaluate student housing on campus.  
“Will there be a greater need next year?” he said, noting that staff must evaluate carefully and consider people in Sherman County who rent homes or apartments to students.  
Hoffman said he’s looking forward to the college becoming more involved in outside activities. He said for the first time the institution sponsored an event during the Sunflower Festival this past weekend and plans to get involved in other ways.  
“We realize that our college reports to an area board of control,” he said, “but we also realize that we’re housed in Goodland and got our start with the Goodland School District.”  
Before the college opened in 1964, the Goodland district, which still owns the property, handed responsibility over to a 24-member board, which represents 24 school districts in northwest Kansas.
