The interim pastor has decided to stay on at Goodland's First Baptist Church, starting as the permanent, full-time minister on Sunday.

Pastor Bud Chester said he and his wife had been happily retired, and he had served as interim pastor in several Kansas towns before coming here.

Teacher shortage a growing problem

TOPEKA (AP) — Not all students in Kansas have certified teachers greeting them as they begin the school year. Legislators were told Monday that revised figures from the Department of Education showed that as of Aug. 1, there were 512 teacher vacancies, compared with 530 at the same time last year. This year's vacancies occurred in 125 of the state's 304 school districts. Most of the vacancies have been

filled with long-term substitutes or retirees who moved to different districts, deputy education commissioner Dale Dennis told the Legislative Educational Planning Committee.

"It's tough," Dennis said. "Administrators say they are stealing from each other, so somebody else ends up being short."

The vacancies, Dennis said, are a rate of 1.4 percent for the more than

34,000 teachers statewide. He said there are vacancies statewide, but particularly among special education teachers, where there were 175 openings.

Dennis said Monday's presentation marked the third time he has given the information in recent weeks in the Statehouse. That, he said, is an indication that the issue is gaining some attention.
