football team will kick off the season against Hays at home Friday at 7 p.m. It'll be tough first game because Hays is a 5A school, while Goodland is a 4A school.


Coach Chris Walters said the Cowboys will be fine tuning some things in practice to prepare for the game, and are a stronger team defensively than
