Toddler is recovering after rattlesnake bite; experts say baby snakes are hatching this time of year

old boy was hospitalized after being Jon Shaffer said. bitten by a rattlesnake while playing in the basement of his rural home.

The boy, bitten Monday morning, was listed in fair condition Monday night at Stormont-Vail Regional Medical Center. His name was not immediately available.

It was unclear how the snake got into the home near Burlingame, about 20 miles southwest of Topeka, but one expert said the 8-inch rattler was probably a baby that had not yet learned to stay away from humans.

"It's that time of year," said Joe Collins, a herpetologist with the Kansas Biological Survey in Lawrence. "All the baby snakes are being born or hatched out, and they're everywhere. There's an explosion in the numbers of both venomous and harmless snakes."

It's also not uncommon for snakes to get into basements, Collins said, particularly in rural areas, older homes or houses where basements were once linked to a well.

Based on the description of the snake that bit the boy Monday, Collins said he thought it was a massasauga, which belongs to the pygmy rattlesnake group and grows to be about 30 inches long. A relative of the child captured the snake and apparently disposed of it
