

# Sainty may be tough

The Goodland Cowboys travel to St. Francis to take on the fourth-ranked Indians in a varsity football game at 6:30 p.m. Friday.

This could be a tough game for the Cowboys, a larger Class 4A school. Goodland has lost its first two games to Hays 51-14 and Holcomb 21-0. The Class 2A Indians whipped Oberlin 37-7 in their first game and beat Quinter 38-12 last week.

The Indians are a big physical team, said Coach Chris Walters, one of the biggest in the state.

"They had almost 400 rushing yards against us last year," he said, "and we

will have to stop their running game to have a shot."

The Cowboys will put nine men close to the line of scrimmage instead of their usual eight, Walters said, to defend against the run.

"Our defense is good enough to win," Walters said, "but we've changed our blocking schemes a little against St. Francis.

"We just need our offense to execute."

Last week against Holcomb, Sean Greenlee led the Cowboys in rushing with 26 runs for 118 yards. Jared Doke threw seven passes for 110 yards, and Andrew Melia led in receiving with four passes caught for 51 yards.

Though not able to get into the end zone, the coach said, the Cowboys made some good plays and have had a week to fine-tune their skills.

They will, however, be without Donald Raymer who played in the slot position lined up off the line of scrimmage. He injured his knee in last week's game and will be out for the season.

Kris Rubio will replace Raymer offensively, and Greenlee will be moved from outside linebacker to inside linebacker to replace him defensively.

Landon West, outside linebacker and defensive guard, is out for the season, and Jordan Bedore, inside linebacker, is having knee surgery.

The Goodland Cowgirls' golf team won the annual Goodland Invitational here Tuesday and placed fifth in the Thomas Moore Prep Invitational on Monday in Hays.

The Cowgirls squeaked by at home with a score of 200 while second-place Syracuse following with 201. Colby was third with 231, Trego/Wakeeney fourth with 234 and Ulysses fifth with 266.

Medalists for the varsity Cowgirls were, second place, Jessica Osborn

with a score of 47; third, StevieLee Raymer with 50; fourth, Kayla Rasure with 50; and ninth Hayley Jarmin with 54.

Ties were broken with a coin toss. The junior varsity medalists were, fourth place, Andrea Fenner with 69; sixth, Bailee Guyer with 69; eighth, Erica Mann with 71; and ninth, Amy Cebula with 71.

Jessica Osborn led the Cowgirls at Hays with a score of 101 and received a medal. Kayla Rasure was next with

114, StevieLee Raymer shot 115 and Christina Beeson had 116 for a team score of 446.

Hays High won the tournament with a score of 366 and the Hays junior varsity was second with a score of 420.

Nickerson was third with 431 and Minneapolis was fourth with 445. Bennington was sixth, Hoisington seventh and Scott City eighth. Thomas Moore and Russell also participated.

The Cowgirls' next action will be at 2 p.m. Monday in Colby.

The seventh-grade Mustangs beat the Tigers 16-6. They were to play at 4:30 p.m. today at Scott City.

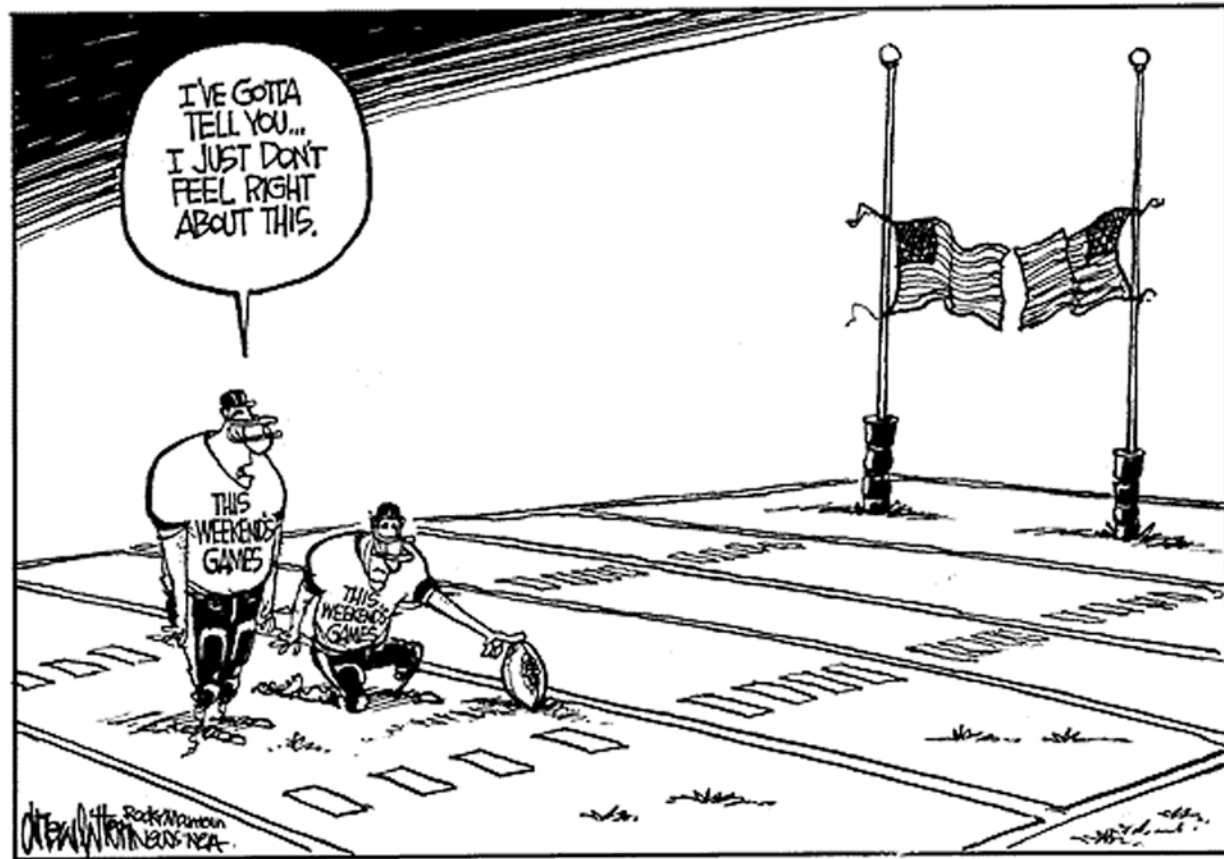

# Attacks force more cancellations

TOPEKA (AP) — As Americans pondered the fallout from this week's terrorist attacks, high school, college and professional sports teams wrestled with whether to play this weekend.

Kansas' high school sports agency said it would leave the decision to local schools, while the Big 12 Conference announced it would play football this weekend, with 10 games scheduled.

League spokesman Bo Carter said travel plans were being finalized Wednesday afternoon, and the only way games would be postponed would be if transportation was not available.

That could prove difficult for Wyoming, which must travel from Laramie to Lawrence to play Kansas, and Louisiana Tech, traveling from Ruston to play No. 12 Kansas State.

Kansas coach Terry Allen said his Jayhawks would wear American flags

on their helmets Saturday against Wyoming in respect for the victims of Tuesday's attacks.

Thursday's game between Texas Tech and Texas-El Paso already had been moved to Saturday.

The decision was easy for officials in the Mid-America Intercollegiate Athletic Conference: The games go on. "We talked with our CEOs, and the consensus is to proceed and move on," said Ralph McFillen, MIAA commissioner.

Missouri Southern State College will play a televised football game Thursday against Southwest Baptist, while the rest of the league will play Saturday, including Washburn and Pittsburg State.

McFillen said the NCAA left the decision to play up to each university and conference. However, universities are asked to make some gesture, such

as prayer or moment of silence, before the games and to contribute to relief or blood drive efforts.

Other small colleges, including the Kansas Collegiate Athletic Conference, planned to play football Saturday.

Football games were still scheduled for Friday night across the state, though several games and practices were canceled for other sports, including soccer games between Lawrence high schools and teams from Johnson County.

In Lawrence, Wednesday's volleyball match between Kansas and Missouri was postponed. Other events were continuing this week as planned.

MIAA officials said a volleyball game and soccer match were postponed because of the attacks. Wichita State's volleyball matches Tuesday with the University of Missouri-Kansas City also were postponed.

# NFL games cancelled, may be re-scheduled

NEW YORK (AP) — The NFL decided today not to play its 15 games this weekend following the terrorist attacks in New York and Washington, but hasn't decided whether to reschedule

or go with a 15-game season.

"We in the National Football league have decided that our priorities for this weekend are to pause, grieve and reflect," Commissioner Paul Tagliabue said in a statement. "It is a time to tend to families and neighbors and all those

wounded by these horrific acts of terrorism."

The postponement was the first for non-strike reasons by the NFL, which played two days after President John F. Kennedy was assassinated on Nov. 22, 1963.

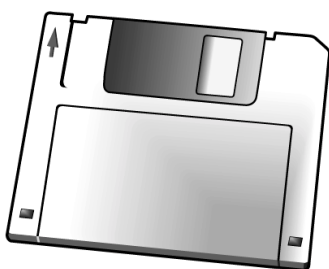
