# **Cowboys lose** homecoming

The Goodland Daily News After having tied the game in the second quarter and keeping the stateranked Atwood Buffaloes to 13 points in the first half, the Goodland Cowboys suffered a heartbreaking 40-7 loss in Friday's homecoming game.

The highlight of the evening was a pre-game performance by the University of Kansas Marching Jayhawk Pep Band. A standing-room-only crowd was on hand for the special performance.

Half-time featured the crowning of Jessica Vignery as homecoming queen and Brian Bahe as king. Lacey Brenner and Brian Mai were the first attendants and Danielle Hellerud and David Russell were the second attendants.

The queen's mother, Judy Vignery, presented the Tanya Armstrong/Cook Memorial Scholarship to Jessica. It is awarded annually to the homecoming queen.

Atwood opened the first quarter with a touchdown and the extra point, making the score 7-0, but Goodland pulled together and made some excellent plays to keep the Buffs at bay.

The Buffaloes had the ball at Goodand's seven yard line on the fourth down and decided to go for the touchdown. The Cowboy defense held the Buffaloes with an incomplete pass, forcing Atwood to turn the ball over on downs.

The second quarter began with Atwood having possession, but the Cowboys contained them, forcing the Buffs to turn the ball over on downs again. Goodland was not able to get the first down and had to punt. The Cow- caught six passes for 50 yards.

boys failed to advance on their next possession as well, turning the ball over on a fumble.

The next Cowboy possession didn't seem to be going any better with an incomplete pass on the first down and an errant pass by Jared Doke into the stands on the second. But Doke threw a pass to Sean Greenlee on the third down that was right on target, and Greenlee ran it into the end zone. Touchdown Cowboys!

The extra point made it a tie game with 5:05 to go in the half.

Atwood regained the lead on the next play, but the Cowboys made them earn it. stopping the Buffaloes on the five yard line and holding them there until the third down. Atwood failed on score 13-7.

Goodland was unable to score on their final two possessions of the half, and the score remained 13-7.

The Cowboys had the first possession in the third quarter but was unable to get the first down and had to punt. Atwood promptly scored a touchdown, setting the tone for the second half

The Buffaloes scored three more touchdowns while the Cowboys spent a lot of time in their own territory. The final score was 40-7.

Greenlee led the Cowboys in rushing with 13 carries for 33 yards, and

## **Buffaloes** run over Jayhawks

BOULDER, Colo. (AP)-When he took the Colorado job in 1999, Gary Barnett said one of his top priorities was to upgrade an almost nonexistent running game.

It appears his Buffaloes, who stampeded over a third straight opponent, have arrived.

Colorado has rushed for 315, 263 and 338 yards in its last three games, the latter helping spark a 27-16 win over Kansas on Saturday.

The Buffs trailed 16-13 early in the fourth quarter before Craig Ochs led them to two touchdowns.

Colorado (3-1, 1-0 Big 12) went ahead when Ochs, who sat out the first three series of the second half because of a concussion and blurred vision, drove the Buffaloes 86 yards in 11 plays, capping the drive with a 17-yard scoring pass to tight end Daniel Graham with 11:04 left.

Moments later, Kansas' Curtis Ansel shanked a punt that traveled only 14 yards, and Chris Brown bolted 40 yards up the middle on the next play with 9:08 remaining.

Kansas freshman Johnny Beck, who earlier kicked a 59-yard field goal, converted a 46-yarder early in the final period to put the Jayhawks (1-2, 0-1 Big 12) in front for the final time.

Determined to run the ball in the second half, Colorado had 246 of its 338 yards rushing after intermission. In total offense, the Buffs outgained the Jayhawks 289-76 after intermission.

Brown ran for 140 yards, including 85 in the final period. Cortlen Johnson had all of his 113 yards rushing in the third period, when Colorado outgained the Jayhawks 122-32.
