Prepared food items must have recipes included. 3. Additional prepared or purchased items may be added 4. Appearance of prepared food items should be attractive and meet standard of the product, i.e. uniform size, evenly browned, etc. 5. Food products will not be opened or tasted-recommended for packaging to allow all or part of product to be seen. As an example, if displayed in a paper or fabric bag, cut a view hole and place product in a plastic bag inside the paper or fabric bag. 6. Evaluation standards include: Creativity in presentation and container. Indicate intended use or theme on the back of entry card. Appropriateness for desired situation considered.
