Cowgirls beat Colby in quad

The Goodland Daily News The Goodland Cowgirls lost their first two matches against teams from Wheatland and Scott City on Saturday at a volleyball quad meet at Max Jones Fieldhouse, but were able to defeat Colby in the last match.

Goodland, Class 4A, lost to Wheatland, a Class 1A school, in three games, falling in the first 15-17, before making a short-lived comeback in the second 17-15. The Cowgirls gave Wheatland the last game, 5-15.

Scott City, another Class 4A school which had already beaten the Cowgirls once this year, defeated Goodland in two games, 4-15 and 7-15, but the Cowgirls pulled it together in the end, taking Colby, also Class 4A, in the last match. Goodland started off weak, losing the first game 5-15, but took the match after beating Colby 15-9 in the second game and 15-9 again in the third.

Coach Jerry McKee said it was a tough day because Goodland was facing strong opponents. He said Scott City was undefeated coming into the quad, while Wheatland had only one loss and Colby had a season record of 6-3. The Cowgirls had a season record of 9-4 going into the match.

The teams played for over seven hours, with Scott City beating Colby, Colby beating Wheatland and Wheatland beating Scott City for the Beavers' first loss of the season.

Coach McKee said the matches were ong because the teams were competitive and basically of equal caliber.

"There were long volleys," he said, "and it was tough to score on your opponent.

The coach said the Cowgirls switched their lineup for Colby and that helped. He said the girls stayed up late Friday night to attend the homecoming dance and that may have made players tired before the day started.

"If we played again tomorrow," he said, "it would go all different."

A bunch of seniors led the Cowgirls through an undefeated regular season last year, but the new team has only one senior and is younger and less experienced. Coach McKee said the team is improving and working out kinks, and the match on Saturday helped the players gain some experience.

We're trying to bring this team along," he said. "We got some excellent experience today. It's unusual to have teams of this caliber in one quad. All of the coaches walked out saying, 'Yeah, that was fun.'"

One problem the Cowgirls had on Saturday was holding onto their lead. At one point in the second game against Wheatland, Goodland had a 10 point lead, 14-4.

Though the Cowgirls won the game, the players let Wheatland close the gap, ending at 17-15. Coach McKee said part of that is just the flow of volleyball and part is the team's inability to play consistently.

"It's just the way the ball bounces," he said, noting that the girls are improving their offensive play, but can't generate the same level of effort throughout the game.

Rockies beat Padres 15-11 at Coors Field

DENVER (AP) — On a big night of hitting at Coors Field, Rickey Henderson's feats might have been most notable.

Henderson closed in on two major milestones, but Larry Walker went 4for-4 with two homers and five runs scored to lead the Colorado Rockies to a 15-11 victory over the San Diego Padres on Monday night.

Henderson was 4-for-5 with three runs scored, leaving him three runs short of tying Ty Cobb's major league record of 2,245 and seven hits shy of 3,000. Henderson also hit his 500th career double.

"I never stop marveling at him," San Diego Padres manager Bruce Bochy said. "He is a warrior and he is a walking baseball record."

Even his opponents were impressed by Henderson.

"Every time he got a hit tonight, I'd come over to first base and ask him how many more he needed (for 3,000)," Rockies first baseman Todd Helton said. "I told him I'd like to see him do it, but I didn't want him to do it tonight."

Henderson has 12 games left this season to reach the marks. He already broke Babe Ruth's career walks record earlier this season and holds the major league mark for most steals.

Tigers beat Royals 4-2; losing streak in K.C. ends

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — Because the game didn't mean much, Steve Sparks didn't feel the need to complete it.

Sparks stopped Kansas City for eight innings and the Detroit Tigers beat the Royals 4-2 Monday night to stop a nine-game losing streak at Kauffman Stadium.

Sparks is tied for the major league lead with six complete games, but decided after 119 pitches that was enough. He told manager Phil Garner he was spent after stranding two runners in the eighth.

"It's one of the games late in the season that literally means nothing," Sparks said. "You get to a certain point and under it (pitches) and dragging a little in a close game. I went as hard as I could as long as I could."

Sparks (12-9) set a career high for victories. The knuckleballer gave up eight hits, walked three and struck out five over eight innings.

Sparks turned over the lead to Matt Anderson, who worked a perfect ninth for his 20th save.

The Tigers won in Kansas City for the first time since July 2, 2000.

"Have we not won a game here (this year)?" Garner said. "Who is counting. Darn right, I'm celebrating.'

Mike Sweeney hit his AL-leading 45th double to drive in two Royals runs in the first. He hit only .174 with one RBI on Kansas City's recent sixgame road trip.

Sweeney has 93 RBIs, and needs seven more to become the first player in team history to record three consecutive 100-RBI seasons.

Licensing issues to be cleared up before Jordan can make comeback

WASHINGTON (AP) - Michael Jordan has said he's not coming back for the money, yet it's big finance that's holding up his official announcement.

A licensing issue involving the league and one of Jordan's sponsors kept the sports world waiting at least another day for confirmation that Jordan will end his three-year retirement and play for the Washington Wizards this season.

A statement from Jordan outlining the reasons for his comeback was getting some final polish Monday, but it never made it to the copy machines.

One major stack of paperwork is complete. Because owners can't play, Jordan had to sell his share in Lincoln Holdings, which owns a portion of the Wizards, the NHL's Washington Capitals and the MCI Center. Jordan's stake, about 10 percent, goes to Lincoln Holdings majority owner Ted Leonsis.

"My understanding is that the ownership documents are finished," NBA deputy commissioner Russ Granik said. "It just requires Michael's decision as to whether he's going to play."

The question of "whether" Jordan will return has essentially been replaced by "when," but this latest dispute over licensing could delay the announcement until the last possible moment. Jordan needs to make his intentions known by next Monday's media day, when the team departs for training camp in Wilmington, N.C.

Rather than be included in the group licensing agreement between the players' union and the league, Jordan reached his own licensing agreement with the NBA in 1992 — a side deal that would remain in effect for the upcoming season and beyond when Jordan returns. The quarrel that led to Monday's holdup apparently involved amending that agreement.
