# Henderson may tie Cobb

DENVER (AP) — Rickey Henderson scored twice and moved within one run of tying Ty Cobb's career record, leading the San Diego Padres over the Colorado Rockies 8-7 Tuesday night.

Henderson boosted his runs total to 2,244. He also had two hits, pulling him within five of No. 3,000.

Henderson drove in three runs, D'Angelo Jimenez had two RBIs and Damian Jackson had two hits and scored twice for the Padres.

Brian Tollberg (8-4) went 7 1-3 innings, allowing five runs and 12 hits. Trevor Hoffman relieved to start the ninth, and Larry Walker led off with his 37th home run and Todd Helton followed with his 45th homer. Hoffman held on for his 40th save.

Mike Hampton (14-12) failed to get his 100th career win, giving up eight runs and 10 hits in six innings.

Walker also doubled in raising his NL-leading average to .354.

The Rockies took a 1-0 lead when Gary Bennett hit his first homer for the Rockies.

Damian Jackson's misplayed foul ball led to a five-run third for San Diego. Alex Arias walked to open the inning and, one pitch after Helton let a pop drop in front of him, Jackson doubled.

Henderson hit a two-run double, Jimenez walked and Phil Nevin hit an RBI double. An error by second baseman Brent Butler on Bubba Trammell's ground ball let two runs score.

Jeff Cirillo's two-out single scored Butler in the Colorado third.

The Padres took an 8-2 lead in the fourth. Henderson drove in a run with an infield hit and Jimenez followed with a two-run double.

Colorado closed to within 8-5 on Hampton's RBI double in the bottom of the fourth and Cirillo's sacrifice fly and an RBI double by Juan Uribe in the fifth.
