

Runners grab for medals

Junior varsity all place in top 10 at Oberlin meet

The Goodland High School varsity and junior varsity cross country teams traveled to Oberlin on Wednesday, with all of the junior varsity runners receiving medals at the invitational meet.

The boys varsity team placed fifth at the annual Oberlin Invitational, with a score of 129, and the girls varsity placed sixth with 121.

Coach Don Smith said he was proud of the runners' efforts, noting that many had their fastest times of the season. He said many of the girls finished a minute faster than previous times.

"I was very pleased with each of the runners," the coach said.

He said it's a young team and it's important that the runners show improvement at each meet, which they have done.

Smith said the junior varsity runners did well, all placing in the top 10.

Jennifer Enfield placed sixth, with a time of 16 minutes and 43 seconds; Jordan Zweygardt placed fourth in 20:42; and Craig Mason finished fifth in 20:50.

The coach said the boys and girls varsity teams did well overall, along with the individual runners.

Speedy Aguilar placed eighth with a time of 17 minutes and 52 seconds;

Gwynn already working on skills for his next job

DENVER (AP) — When his retirement becomes effective at the end of this season, Tony Gwynn will begin coaching at his alma mater, San Diego State. He's already getting a head start.

Ben Davis, who broke out of a month-long slump with three hits and two RBIs Wednesday night as the Padres beat the Colorado Rockies 3-1, credited Gwynn for his turnaround.

"It has helped talking to Tony about hitting my pitch and not hitting the pitcher's pitch," Davis said. "He's all about the team. To have a guy like that to talk to on a daily basis, it's great. He never talks about himself. You tell him what you're doing and he breaks it down in terms

you can understand."

In his previous 26 games, Davis was 14-for-93 (.151) and saw his average drop from .265 to .240. In his last 15 games, he was 8-for-49 (.163) with 18 strikeouts.

Brian Lawrence (5-4) allowed six hits and one run, walking three and striking out four.

"It was my first time pitching here (Coors Field)," Lawrence said. "I knew that bad things could definitely happen here"

Shawn Chacon went six solid innings for Colorado, allowing two hits and leaving with the score 1-1.

The Rockies went ahead 1-0 in the first when Juan Pierre led off with a double, went to third on a wild pitch and scored on Jeff Cirillo's single.

K-State looking for a victory over the Sooners

KANSAS CITY, Mo. —Like a medieval knight on a quest for revenge, Kansas State trudges ever onward in a tireless search for respect.

Actually, the Wildcats probably have more than they suspect. Capping Bill Snyder's remarkable turnaround of what used to be the football's losingest program, they've won at least nine games in each of the past eight years.

They're one of eight schools who have been to a bowl game every season since 1993.

They've whipped Nebraska twice in three seasons and, with the possible exception of a last-minute loss to Purdue in the 1998 Alamo Bowl, beaten every team they were "supposed" to beat.

Yet, insecurity lingers. Resentment simmers.

For Wildcat fans, Saturday's showdown with No. 3 Oklahoma is more than a vital step toward possibly capturing a Big 12 championship.

It's also an opportunity to vindicate themselves in the eyes of critics who they perceive as refusing to let them assume their rightful place among the college football elite.

"This is where we show people we're for real," said running back Josh Scobey, who had four touchdowns in the 11th-ranked Wildcats' runaway victory over New Mexico State last week.

"And that's what we're going to do. There's a time to talk. Saturday, we'll do all the talking on the field."

Twice since 1998, Kansas State has advanced to the Big 12 title game, each time falling short. Many fans and players figure the failure to win the conference championship has played into the hands of everybody who sneers that no Snyder team has ever won "a big game."

"Until we win the championship

game, I think that we are missing a lot of recognition," said wide receiver/kick returner Aaron Lockett.

"Once we do win that, I think that we will be at ease and it will be a step up for our team."

A loss to the Sooners would be a bitter pill indeed. It would mark the third time in one calendar year the defending national champs have gotten the best of them.

But Lockett, who had a 97-yard kickoff return last week and could be a difference-maker on Saturday, dismisses the revenge factor.

"You can't really take a championship away from them, so revenge wouldn't be the key," he said. "Since it is our first Big 12 game, I think that we want to start the season off toward an accomplishment."

Unlike last year, the Wildcats will not have a seasoned senior quarterback lining up against Oklahoma's talented defense. Redshirt freshman Eli Roberson, one of the most highly sought recruits of the Snyder era, has replaced Jonathan Beasley.

In season-opening victories over New Mexico State and USC, Roberson has been inconsistent as a passer and dangerous as a runner.


But powered by Scobey and fullback Rock Cartwright, the Wildcats will present a much more potent running game than the Sooners saw last year.

"With us trying to break in eight new starters, it would probably be better to play them a bit later," said defensive coordinator Phil Bennett. "We have made strides from the first game to the second game, and we have to keep that up."

Nobody, says defensive back Jon McGraw, is approaching the Sooners with vengeance in mind.

"Everyone is focused and it's going to be an intense week of preparation for us," he said. "It is special because how many times do you get to play the same team three times in less than a year?"
