Sept. 28 1901: KILLED IN A RUNAWAY - Joseph Walker, an Aged Mail Carrier, Thrown From a Road Cart and Kicked to Death by the Horse. Joseph Walker, carrier of the mail from Goodland to Charlotte, was killed about six miles northeast of town. No one saw the accident but he was found by his nephew, James Walker, who was coming to Goodland. (Charlotte Post Office was located about 13 miles northeast of Goodland.)

Ray T. Isernhagen
Longtime Goodland resident Ray Theodore Isernhagen, 78, died Thursday, Sept. 27, 2001, at Goodland Regional Medical Center.

He was born Jan. 23, 1923, near Agra in Phillips County to Mary (Schiewbert) and Ernest Isernhagen. His family moved to Goodland in 1934.

He married Mary Lou Hartzler on Oct. 16, 1945. In 1945-1946, he served in the Army during the occupation of Germany.

In addition to farming part time, Mr. Isernhagen worked for the U.S. Soil Conservation Service from 1950 until he retired in 1980. He was the Sherman County deputy appraiser from 1980 to 1988.

Before and after retirement, he enjoyed devoting time to Emmanuel Lutheran Church in Goodland. He was a lifetime member of the church and was active in the Aid Association for Lutherans, Lutheran Brotherhood, National Association of Retired Federal Employees and Veterans of Foreign Wars.

Students from across Kansas bring message of hope in play

Fall a good time to rid your lawn of those pesky broadleaf weeds

This is one of those times of the year when using a broadleaf weed killer makes some sense. Fall is an important time to both plant and fertilize cool-season grasses AND an excellent time to kill cool-season broadleaf weeds like dandelions.

Why? Because during the fall, perennial weeds such as dandelions are growing vigorously and are translocating food to the root system in preparation for winter. Fall-applied herbicides are translocated with the food stream to the roots and the entire plant is killed.

During the spring, dandelions and similar weeds are funneling resources to the shoots and flowers, so this "go with the flow" approach is less effective. Before any further discussion of the details of broadleaf herbicide applications, remember that broadleaf herbicides should be avoided if you have planted new seed this fall or are planning to soon. In a year like this, when many folks have overseeded or started from scratch, wait until November to apply broadleaf herbicides.

Two primary types of broadleaf herbicides exist: granular products (often in combination with fertilizer) and liquid products. Neither type should be

applied to turf that is drought-stressed or when temperatures are above 80 degrees. Best control with these herbicides will be achieved when the weeds are actively growing, when soil moisture is plentiful and air temperatures are in the 60- to 75-degree range.

With liquid herbicides, do not mow for several days before and after the application to allow for maximum uptake and translocation of the herbicide. Do not water for at least 24 hours after application, and do not treat if rain is expected within 24 hours. Always read and follow the herbicide label instructions carefully to maximize the efficiency of your applications.

Compared with liquid herbicide applications, granular products may be slightly less effective. Convenience is their greatest attribute and, when used properly, granular herbicides can provide good control of broadleaf weeds.

If winter annuals like henbit and chickweed are not a concern, as is normally the case in a fairly dense, healthy fescue or bluegrass lawn, you can use a combined fertilizer/broadleaf herbicide product for the September fertilization.

However, if winter annuals are a concern or if you have recently planted new turf seed, then use the combination product for the November fertilization. At that time, many of the winter annual seeds will have germinated and will be susceptible to the herbicide application. Pick a relatively warm day (55 degrees or up) in early November.

Some late-germinating winter annuals will be missed, but you will get the bulk of them, and any escapes can be spot sprayed in the spring if necessary. In either case, the grass should be wet when applying granular products because the herbicide must stick to the foliage for maximum effectiveness. Apply them early in the morning when dew is present, or after a rain or irrigation.

Points to be considered in selecting soil conservation award winners include use of land according to its capabilities; completeness of farm plan applied; balance of farm enterprise; quality of conservation work done and maintenance of practices; and special practices unique to the operation.
