### City to designate voting wards

The Goodland Daily News The Goodland City Commission will continue discussion about an ordinance allowing livestock in certain areas of the city and plans to approve ordinances designating boundaries of voting wards in the city and annexing land on Monday.

Some Goodland landowners thought they were allowed to keep livestock within the city limits by a grandfather clause in an ordinance passed in 1972, but learned this year that a 1992 ordinance outlawed all livestock in the

The landowners spoke to the city commission at past meetings, asking to be allowed to keep their animals.

The city attorney drafted the ordinance allowing animals in some areas of the city, but the commission was unable to come to an agreement about the restrictions at the Sept. 17 meeting.

The ordinance was tabled and scheduled for discussion Monday's meeting. In other business, the commission will:

• Approve an ordinance regulating parking in front of the Carnegie Arts

• Approve a lease with the Federal Aviation Administration for building space.

• Hear a proposal from Evans, Bierly, Hutchinson and Associates for a sewer plant evaluation.
