

Cowboys score five touchdowns in P-burg

Goodland scored five touchdowns and two extra points Friday at Phillipsburg's homecoming but the Cowboys still suffered their fifth loss of the season as the Panthers scored twice as much, winning 64-32.

The Cowboys kept up the fight through the last seconds of the game, using up their time-outs to try to put a sixth touchdown on the board, but ran out of time.

"They played hard," Coach Chris Walters said, "and put forth a good effort."

But a good effort doesn't always translate into a win. Mistakes, penalties and runaway opponents all hurt.

"We need to cut back on our mistakes," Walters said, "and shore up our defense."

The defense will be working on tackling and pursuits, he said, and the offense will work on blocking.

"If we can't get these fundamentals down," the coach said, "it doesn't matter what kind of offense we run."

Injuries have been a factor, though, with Donald Raymer, Landon West, Kris Rubio and Malcom White on the sidelines for the rest of the season. Jordan Bedore and Brandon Nemechek are out right now but may be back, the coach said.

Phillipsburg got a touchdown and two-point conversion on its first possession, making the score 8-0.

Then the Cowboys got their turn. The team had the ball for less than a minute before being forced to punt, but a Panther penalty gave them another chance. The Panther defense kept the Cowboys to minus yardage. Phillipsburg got the ball back and scored its second touchdown and extra point.

The Cowboys were down 15-0. Their next possession yielded a fumble, turning the ball over to Phillipsburg who promptly made the score 22-0.

Goodland failed to score on their next possession but held Phillipsburg and got their chance. Sean Greenlee set up the touchdown with a 24-yard run, putting the Cowboys first and goal at the three yard line. Greenlee ran the

ball in with 9:25 to go in the half, making the score 22-6.

The Panthers were not through yet. They scored on their next possession, 29-6.

An 18-yard kick return was a good start for the Cowboys, who then nearly lost the ball on downs but for Jared Duke's run. Two plays later, Goodland scored on a pass to Andrew Melia, 29-12.

That left the Cowboys down 36-12 at the half.

Goodland started the second half with a 20-yard kickoff return by Sam Smith to set up their first possession of the third quarter. The boys scored on the second down as Duke threw a 65-yard touchdown pass to Greenlee, 36-

18.

Phillipsburg's next possession yielded another touchdown and extra point, making the score 43-18.

A series of sacks and penalties kept both teams out of the end zone until Phillipsburg brought the score to 50-18.

The Panthers scored again early in the fourth quarter making it 57-18. Not to be kept down, the Cowboys scored on three plays, making it 57-25.

Phillipsburg followed up with their final touchdown, making the score 64-25 with 3:47 to go in the game.

The Cowboys needed only two plays to score on a 47-yard run by Greenlee, 64-32. They held the Panthers back and got the ball with 32 seconds to go in the

game. Using their time-outs, the Cowboys tried to squeeze one more touchdown out of those few seconds but ran out of time with a final score of 64-32.

Greenlee led the Cowboys in rushing with 10 carries for 124 yards and three touchdowns. Bryan Mai earned 38 yards in eight carries.

Doke through 12 complete passes for 286 yards and two touchdowns. Greenlee caught four passes for 164 yards and one touchdown, and Melia caught five passes for 83 yards and a touchdown. Melia kicked the two extra points for the Cowboys.

The Cowboys had 428 offensive yards to Phillipsburg's 401 but had fewer first downs with 13 to the Panthers' 17.

Tennis team wins Norton tourney

The Cowgirl tennis team won the Norton Invitational Tournament on Thursday following a fourth-place finish in the Colby Invitational on Tuesday.

The Cowgirls scored 25 points with 68 percent of the points won to win in Norton. The Norton team had 25 points also but only had 66.3 percent of the total points won.

In the No. 1 doubles, Jessica Vignery and Jennifer Mentzer finished 3-0 with wins over Koops/Shorter of Osborne 6-1, Dial/Kelly of Colby 6-1 and Kaus/Otter of Norton 6-3.

The No. 2 doubles play found Megan McCall and Michelle Kibel taking first with a 3-0 record. Their victories came over Beisner/Knoll of Osborne 6-0, Talsma/Nicholson of Colby 6-3 and Donehey/Jueneman of Norton 6-4.

In the No. 1 singles, Abby Sheopner finished second, winning two out of three matches. Her wins were over Emerson of Osborne 6-4 and Woodall of Colby 6-1. She lost to Bonnett of Norton 6-2.

Shannon Showalter won second in the No. 2 singles with a 2-1 record. She beat Brooks of Osborne 6-2 and Hersherberger of Colby 6-0. She gave Henderson of Norton a good match but

lost 6-4.

"The girls played well throughout the day," Coach Wallace Hansen said, "winning 10 out of 12 matches."

Norton finished second, Colby third and Osborne fourth.

The girls finished fourth out of eight teams at the Colby Invitational, scoring 16 points. Ulysses won the meet and Tribune was second.

Showalter finished second in No. 2 singles beating Bauman of Phillipsburg 8-5 and Kara Sloan 8-4. She lost to Epp of Tribune 8-3 in the championship.

The No. 2 doubles team of Ashley Engel and McCall also finished second. They beat Kjellburg/Kjellburg of Ness City 8-0 and Gruerholz/Taylor of Phillipsburg 8-2. They lost to Hoffman/Moritz of Tribune 8-1 in the championship match.

In the No. 1 singles, Scheopner lost to K. Lang of Colby 8-0 and Crystal Mannebach of Colby 8-5. The No. 1 Doubles team of Vignery and Mentzer lost to Amos/Palser of Colby 8-3 and to the Phillipsburg team of Dusi/Ellenberger 8-5.

The next action for the Cowgirls will be in Scott City on Thursday. This meet will replace the Larned meet that was scheduled for Tuesday.



New speedway has runaway winner

KANSAS CITY, Kan. (AP) — Jeff Gordon started up front, finished in front and stayed out front.

Gordon continued his push toward his first Winston Cup title since 1998 on Sunday, widening his points lead over Ricky Rudd with a win in a crash-filled Protection One 400 at the new Kansas Speedway.

"There's no doubt that when you get knocked off the mountain, you've got to search your soul to find out if you've got the desire to climb the mountain again," said Gordon. "For the past couple of years, it's been a challenge, but I knew I had the desire."

Gordon's No. 24 Chevrolet pulled away from rookie Ryan Newman after a red flag halted the race for 11 minutes in the closing laps.

Getting his series-leading sixth win

of the season — and his third career win at a new track, tops in NASCAR's last 30 years — came down to more than desire for the three-time Cup champion. He widened his lead over Rudd by 10 points and leads by 222 points with eight races remaining.

Gordon caught three critical breaks. The first came on the opening lap when he was able to move down quickly from the outside front spot to the inside groove on the slick 1 1/2-mile tri-oval.

The second came when Bill Elliott, who led for 33 laps early in the race, blew his engine in the 135th lap.

The biggest break, though, came on lap 230 when Rusty Wallace was sent back to the 17th spot for speeding on pit road.

"I hated to see that happen to Rusty, but I wasn't surprised," Gordon said.

"You know Rusty — he's always pushing the limits on pit road. You'd think a guy who had been penalized for that before would back down a little bit."

Wallace fought back through the pack after the penalty and finished fourth behind Gordon, Newman and Rudd.
