Oct. 2 1901: Charley Knight, an 8year-old son of C.M. Knight, was bitten on the right hand by a rattlesnake at his father's ranch on the Smoky, 12 miles south of Goodland. Mr. Knight gave the boy whiskey and tied a ligature on the wrist and then brought him to town where he was treated by Dr. Gandy. The arm and hand was badly swollen and the boy was suffering much pain, but he will recover.
