

Cowboys lose to Red Devils

The Goodand Daily News Fumbles, interceptions and penalties kept the Goodland Cowboys from getting their first win of the season, as they lost to the Oberlin Red Devils 48-0 Friday.

The Cowboys went into the game with an 0-5 record and seeking a badly needed win against the 1-4 Red Devils. However, they were not able to capitalize on the opportunity to face another team with a losing record.

The Cowboys started the season against a tough opponent in the Class 5A Hays Indians, then faced the Holcomb Longhorns, the St. Francis Indians, the Atwood Buffaloes and the Phillipsburg Panthers. Both St. Francis and Atwood were state ranked in Class 2A.

They faced St. Francis and Phillipsburg in their homecoming games, as was the case with Oberlin.

The first quarter was uneventful until the Cowboys' second fumble led to a touchdown. But that was just the ysses Tigers.

beginning of the end for Goodland. The Cowboys had six turnovers, four fumbles and two interceptions, and 11 penalties. Three of the fumbles and one of the interceptions set up touchdowns for the Red Devils.

"Turnovers and miscues really hurt us," Coach Chris Walters said. "We didn't play good football and just didn't do what it takes to win.

"Every time we started to move the ball or did something good, we'd get a penalty and shoot ourselves in the foot."

The Cowboys never made it into Oberlin territory and, in the second half, had the mercy rule applied to them. If a team is down by 40 points or more, the clock runs continuously for the rest of the game.

The Red Devils scored a touchdown with 11:13 to go in the third quarter making the score 42-0.

Goodland will play at home at 6:30 p.m. Friday, facing the Class 4A Ul-

Johnny Beck kicked his fourth field goal in the second overtime and Mario Kinsey came off the bench to lead the comeback as Kansas rallied to a 34-31 victory over Texas Tech Saturday night.

"This is what I live for, I live for the big-time situations like this so we can make the play and I can hush everybody up," Kinsey said. "It just feels good to beat Texas Tech at their homecoming.

Trailing 24-13 in the third quarter, the Jayhawks (2-2, 1-1 Big 12) rallied with two scores in a span of 4:11 to send the game into overtime. Beck kicked a 44-yard field goal and Kinsey threw a 5-yard touchdown pass to Termaine Fulton. Reggie Duncan's run for the 2point conversion tied the game at 24.

Beck then kicked a 37-yard field goal for the go-ahead points and Marcus Rogers secured the victory for the Jayhawks by intercepting Symons' pass on Tech's second overtime possession.

"I tried to help the offense run, but I made a mistake," Symons said. "I'm still learning, and it will make me a better player."
