

Brewster loses in short game

BREWSTER — The Brewster High School Bulldogs couldn't stop the Greeley County Jackrabbits in a 52-6 point rule loss in just three quarters Friday night.

The points rule gives coaches a choice between stopping the game or playing it out with a running clock after Tribune took a 44-point lead at the end of the first half.

The 'Dawgs were unable to stop the Tribune running game as, true to their name, the Jackrabbits scored three touchdowns in the first quarter for a 22-0 lead.

Greeley County scored again with 5:36 in the second to lead 30-0. On the next possession, however, the Bulldogs got on the board with a Jacob Falcon pass to Sean Swanson on second and 20. The 2-point conversion failed and with 3:57 left in the half, the score was 30-6.

Greeley County scored again on a three-play drive and it looked like Brewster would return the favor when

Falcon's return was stopped at the Tribune 10. Four plays later, the Jackrabbits took over on down and scored on a 70-yard quarterback keeper by Trent Peter, ending the half with a 44-6 lead.

Brewster opened the third quarter with a solid drive, and were at the red zone with seven minutes in the third. Greeley County again held, taking over on their own 19, driving for the last touchdown, ending the game with 2:58 left in the third quarter.

Falcon had 15 passes for 25 yards with one interception. He also scrambled three times for two yards.

Ty Dixon had four receptions for 87 yards. He also had nine carries for a loss of 11 yards.

Sean Swanson had three receptions for 38 yards and Brewster's only touchdown. He also gained six yards on the ground.

J.R. Baird had three receptions for 22 yards and one rush for six yards. Jess Long had five yards.

Brewster hosts Grinnell on Friday for homecoming. Game time is 7:30 p.m. Central Time.

Timothy Kafka finished 32nd at 19:41; Josef Felver was 52nd at 21:36; Craig Mason was 54th at 21:53; and Shawn Weber was 57th at 22:30.

Hutchinson Trinity won the boys meet. Larned was second, Ellsworth was third, Pratt fourth, Goodland fifth and Fairfield sixth. Hoisington, Thomas Moore Prep-Marian, Lyons, Sterling, St. John, Wilson, Central Christian and Stafford all had no team scores.

Charlie Short was the top finisher for the Cowgirls at 25th, with a time of 15:11. The individual champion for the girls was Moor of Hutch Trinity with a time of 12:40.

Wendy Keith finished 29th at 15:31; Chelsee Phillips was 36th at 16:53; and Jennifer Enfield was 37th at 17:02.

Rockies first baseman says season was terrible

DENVER (AP) — Todd Helton saw no reason to be diplomatic, to sugarcoat the just-concluded season that left such a bitter aftertaste.

"It was terrible," the Colorado Rockies first baseman said Sunday. "We had high expectations and definitely didn't live up to them."

"I think any season's pretty bad if you don't make the playoffs or at least give it a really good run."

Added right fielder Larry Walker, "We got off to a decent start, then the wheels fell off and it didn't turn out well. Back to the drawing board."

Even his third NL batting title in the last four years couldn't assuage Walker. "They've all been kind of miserable," said Walker, noting that each of his titles has come in a losing season. "I'm not going to sit here and get all joyful about stuff that I've done when we're going home to start playing golf instead of continuing on."

What went wrong?

"The bullpen was suspect, we didn't have a closer, we could always use more hitting," Walker said. "I'll finger-point at everything."

The Rockies finished 2001 with a 73-89 record and in last place in the NL West, 19 games behind division winner

Arizona — an unanticipated decline from their 82-80 mark a year earlier.

The season began with high expectations because of the most talented pitching staff in their history, an array of productive hitters and an emphasis on defense and speed.

Competitive for the first 2 1/2 months of the season, the Rockies began unraveling in mid-June.

After sweeping a three-game series in Cincinnati, the Rockies were 36-32 and just 5 1/2 games out of first place on June 17. In what has become a traditional mid-season flop, they went 5-25 over their next 30 games, falling to 41-57 and 16 games behind — a collapse from which they would never recover.

"What has happened here in late June, early July, we've got to figure that out," general manager Dan O'Dowd said. "The bottom line is, we had to make a lot of changes, and we lost the club we started with. Keeping the club together was something that economically we were not allowed to do."

Just days after the swoon subsided, O'Dowd came under attack for trades that sent popular shortstop Neifi Perez and pitcher Pedro Astacio packing.

Team volleys to fourth in tourney

Despite losing three of the four matches they played, the Cowgirl junior varsity volleyball team managed to place fourth on Saturday at an invitational junior varsity/freshman tournament in Hays.

Goodland's freshman team also walked away with only one win, but Coach Dave Hardy said the players performed better than they have all season.

Mitch Hixson, the junior varsity coach, said the team's play was mixed, as the Cowgirls performed well against some tough opponents, but gave up games by making too many errors.

The junior varsity faced Salina South first, losing in two games, but playing strong. The Cowgirls fell 11-15 in the first game, and came close in the second, 13-15.

"We played well against Salina

South," Hixson said. "That might have been the best junior varsity team we've played all year, but we were right there with them."

His comments weren't as positive about the second match against Hays' Thomas More Prep, where the Cowgirls lost in three games, winning the second 15-9, but falling in the first and third, 6-15 and 11-15.

"The loss to TMP should bother us," the coach said. "We gave TMP plenty of opportunities to beat us and they did."

Goodland went on to snatch a win from Smith Center in two games, 15-8 and 16-14, and that was enough to advance the team to the finals, where the Cowgirls faced Dodge City.

Hixson said despite a good effort, Goodland lost its first game to Dodge, 9-15, and then sputtered through the second game, losing 3-15.

"We played a good first game against

Dodge," he said, "then ran out of gas in the second game."

Coach Hardy said the freshman Cowgirls stepped up their play, beating Otis Bison in two games and giving Salina South and Dodge City a run for their money.

"They had a couple of flat spots," the coach said, "but they played much better than they have all year."

The Cowgirls stomped Otis-Bison, 15-6 and 15-5, in their second match of the day. Before that, the girls played a good first game against Salina South, losing 11-15, but hit one of those flat spots in the second, falling 2-15.

Coach Hardy said Goodland racked up a bunch of points in the first match against Dodge, but then allowed the team to tie it up and lost 13-15. Despite playing strong in the second, the coach said the team lost 9-15.

Hardy has said the team's biggest

problem is not playing consistently, but the Cowgirls didn't have much of a problem with that on Saturday.

"A lot is passing," the coach said. "When we pass well, we run a good attack. They just played really well most of the day and hung right with them. If we can do that one more time, we'll do good."

The freshman team has now won three matches this season, which is three more than the team won last year. The Cowgirls will travel to Hoxie on Thursday for a quad match, which will be the last of the season.

The varsity and junior varsity teams will travel to Oakley today to face teams from Oakley, Grinnell and Weskan in a quad match that will start at 2:30 p.m. Mountain Time. It's the last quad match for the varsity team before the Northwest Kansas League Tournament at Max Jones Fieldhouse on Saturday.

Outstanding players share honors in the Big 12

DALLAS (AP) — There were so many outstanding performances in the Big 12 this past weekend that the league named co-players of the week on offense, defense and special teams.

Kansas running back Reggie Duncan and Nebraska quarterback Eric Crouch shared the offensive honor, Colorado cornerback Donald Strickland and Oklahoma safety Roy Williams shared the defensive honor and the special teams honor went to kickers Johnny Beck of Kansas and Brad Hammerich of Missouri.

Duncan rushed for a career-high 227 yards on 38 carries to lead the Jayhawks to a 34-31 double overtime win at Texas Tech. He forced the first overtime with a 2-point conversion run with 21 seconds left in regulation.

Crouch became the all-time NCAA Division I-A quarterback leader in career touchdowns rushing with 51 by running for four scores. He ran 15 times for 104 yards and was 10-for-14 passing for 110 yards in a 48-14 win over Iowa State.

Strickland had 10 tackles and three pass deflections as Colorado upset Kansas State 16-6. He also provided key run support as the Buffaloes held KSU to 74 yards rushing, more than 200 below their average.

Williams helped clinch the Sooners' 14-3 win over Texas with a flying hit on a blitz that allowed teammate Teddy Lehman to make a 2-yard interception return for a TD. Williams also inter-

cepted a pass and broke up two others.

Beck, a freshman walk-on, made field goals of 42, 42, 44, and 37 yards. The last one won the double OT game against Texas Tech.

Hammerich went 4-for-4 on field goals in the Tigers' 41-38 triple overtime victory at Oklahoma State. His 36-yard three-pointer was the game winner in the third OT.


