Eliminate old pesticides

A question I have been asked several times over the years is, "What can I do with pesticides that are left over on the farm?"

There are not many things you can do with unused pesticides, using them according to the label. However, over the years you may have accumulated a number of pesticides that can not be used that way.

Whatever the reason for having waste pesticides around, they are a problem. This November, we have a chance to remove these waste pesticides from the countryside through a program set up by the Kansas Department of Health and Environment called Kansas Clean Sweep.

This year, Clean Sweep is a free waste pesticide collection event for Kansas farmers and ranchers. The goal is to remove unwanted pesticides from Kansas operations. Any farmer or rancher who operates in Kansas is eligible for the program. Pesticide dealers, manufacturers and distributors are not eligible.

Any current, canceled, unwanted, unused, obsolete or damaged pesticide is eligible for the program. Although any pesticide will be accepted, it is important for you to search your farm or ranch storage areas for canceled products. The continued use of some canceled products may be illegal.

The list below has some canceled products which were commonly used



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in Kansas. If you have any of these, or any other pesticide in need of disposal, now is the time to act.

Pesticide collections will be held across Kansas. The sites and dates nearest to Sherman County producers are Sharon Springs, Tuesday, Nov. 6, and St. Francis, Wednesday, Nov. 7.

In order to provide enough manpower and equipment for each site, farmers need to pre-register by calling 800-282-9790, or by picking up a pre-registration form here at the Sherman County Extension office and mailing it to the department. You will be given collection times and directions to the site.

Some pesticides in need of disposal: Aldrin, carbon tetrachloride, Clordane, Chlordimeform, Daminozide, DBCP, DDT, Dieldrin, Dinoseb, ethylene dibromide, Endrin, ENP, Heptachlor, Kepone, pentachlorophenol, Silvex, 2,3,5-T, toxaphene, and tri-chlorophenol. Obsolete pesticides and other pesticides also will be accepted.

This is a no questions asked, no fees to pay program. I would recommend you act now for proper disposal of unwanted pesticides. Please give me a call at the office (899-4880) if you have questions.

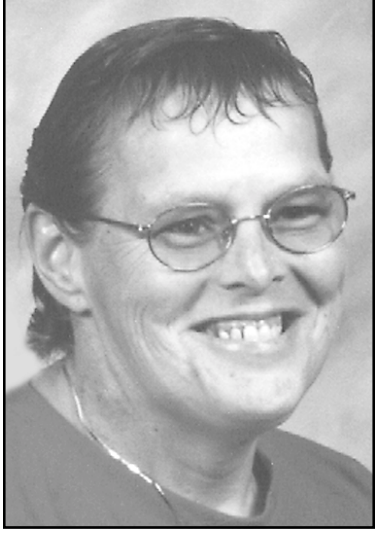
In addition to her parents, she was preceded in death by two sisters, Florine Burt and Marie Platt.

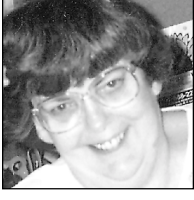
Graduate of Class of '44 visits friends
