Oct. 11, 1901: A RUNAWAY BOY— Bert Kline, 13 years old, Wanted to Leave Because He Disliked Going To School — Got as Far as Edson. — Bert Kline thought that he would like to go out and see the world so decided that he would run away from home. He began his preparations by going to H.H. Auer, who he told that his mother wanted to borrow \$10. Mr. Auer gave the boy \$7 and told him that his mother could just as well have \$10, but he did not have change. The boy then went to different stores about town and bought a coat, cap, and gloves, charging them to his father. A search was made and outgoing trains were watched and instructions left at the depot not to sell him a ticket. However, he was found at Edson having walked ten miles, and was brought back to Goodland. He still had most of the \$7 and seemed pleased to return home. Bert is an adopted son of Engineer Frank Kline, and is well treated at home. He was prompted to run away because he did not like going to school and the desire of most all boys when reaching a certain age to go out and see the world.
