The men's 1 mile race was won by Brandon Zelfer, Goodland, in 6:34, and second place was Tim Lee, Goodland, 7:23.

Peggy Blake, Goodland, won the women's 2 mile walk, 29:19.

John Cozad, Goodland, won the men's 2 mile walk, 29:20.

Hannah Blake, Goodland, won the girl's half-mile fun run, 3:50. Jessica Bauman, Goodland, was second, 5:13; and Kate Zelfer, Goodland, was third, 7:43.

Tiffany Thomas, Goodland, broke her own school record in the Grant Junior High 1 mile exhibition run for girls. Thomas set the record of 6:29 last year, and set a new school record at 6:14.

Chiefs prepare for 'Bus' to roll in

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — The Kansas City Chiefs can replay all of the Pittsburgh Steelers' game tapes, diagram all of their formations, run through all of their plays.

But there's one thing they can't duplicate in workouts this week — because guys who can run like Jerome Bettis take handoffs on Sundays, not on practice squads.

The Bus rolls into Kansas City this Sunday, fresh off a 153-yard performance in last Sunday's 16-7 win over Cincinnati — rushing numbers that put him over the 10,000-yard mark for his career.

Kansas City, meanwhile, is coming off

a 20-6 loss to Denver in which the Broncos' Mike Anderson ran for 155 yards.

About all the Chiefs can do this week, coach Dick Vermeil said Wednesday, is practice their tackling techniques.

"You don't want to hit him up around the shoulder pads," Vermeil said. "He can definitely make you bounce."

Linebacker Lew Bush agreed.

"He's a big man and he's been doing this for a long time," Bush said. "You've really got to be technically sound."

"He has great vision. He's got great power, and at the same time he's also got great feet," Bush added.


And even though Steelers coach Bill

Cowher held the 5-foot-11, 255-pound Bettis out of practice on Wednesday to rest his injured knee, the Chiefs expect him to be at full speed — and full force — on Sunday.

"I'm looking forward to the challenge," defensive end Eric Hicks said. "Any time you can go against a great running back, that's what defense is all about. We really need to redeem ourselves after last week, and what better way to do that than against one of the game's best running backs?"

And even with technical perfection, Hicks said, bringing Bettis down will be a job for everyone on the Chiefs' defense.

The Cowgirls tied for fifth at the Class 4A regional tennis tournament at Scott City Monday.

The team tied with Pratt and Norton for fifth out of eleven schools. Ulysses won the meet and Larned was second.

Goodland came within an eyelash of qualifying the doubles team of Jessica Vignery and Jennifer Mentzer for state. They lost a quarterfinal match with Amos and Palser of Colby 6-1, 0-6, 3-6 with several deuce games in the last set.

The girls played their best tennis of the year, Coach Wallace Hansen said, winning the first round with an 8-5 victory over Haynes and Murao of Chaparral then playing the one and a half hour match with Colby.

Goodland's other doubles team of Megan McCall and Leslie Knitig won their first round match with Kaus and

Otter of Norton 8-6 then lost to Dikeman and Flint of Larned 8-1. The Larned team went on to a second place finish, losing to Anderson and Eudey of Ulysses, last year's state champion.

In singles play Abby Scheopner advanced to the second round with a seeded bye then played Galle and Pratt, losing 8-6 in a close match.

"Abby played really good tennis at the end of the year," Hansen said, "and was always an inspiration to the rest of the team."

The junior varsity team won their own invitational, he said, and competed well at the other meets they attended.

Nine girls earned letters for the season: seniors Scheopner and Vignery, juniors Ashley Engel, Amber Ridder, Knitig and Michelle Kibel, sophomores McCall, and Mentzer and freshman Showalter.

"The team would like to thank the City of Goodland and the United School District 352 school board for combining to build the courts at Steever Park," Hansen said, "as the courts were thoroughly enjoyed."



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
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
