Quest **for win** goes on

The Goodland Daily News Still on a quest for their first win of the season, the 0-6 Goodland Cowboys face off against the Class 4A Ulysses Tigers at home at 6:30 p.m. tonight.

Ulysses could prove to be a tough opponent, with 11 returning starters from a 9-3 team that played in the substate championship last year.

They had a great team last year, Coach Chris Walters said, and a good team this year also.

Ulysses' offense runs a formation where they pull the guards, Walters said, which means that instead of blocking straight ahead, they go to the side and run down field. If our outside linebackers come up and meet the pull, he said, the Cowboys will have a chance of stopping them.

Goodland's offense will try to spread out, the coach said, to have one-on-one coverage since their guys are bigger. The Cowboys will try to run some misdirection, he said, and try to keep the Tigers off-balance.

And the key to the Cowboy offense, Walters said, is to run the ball.

He said the Cowboys shot themselves in the foot last week in Oberlin last week, with six turnovers becoming Red Devil touchdowns. The Cowboys have had a tough schedule this season, playing the Class 5A Hays Indians and two state-ranked Class 2A teams, Atwood and St. Francis.

Goodland's offense has struggled and whenever the Cowboys were able to score touchdowns, their defense was unable to hold their opponents back. They have good players, Walters said, but have had several sidelined with injuries and have not jelled as a team.
