

Cowboys freeze Friday

After being down 47-0, the Goodland Cowboys scored two touchdowns in the fourth quarter on an icy field, still losing the game 47-12 to the Ulysses Tigers Friday.

A small but enthusiastic home crowd turned out on a cold night to cheer on the Cowboys.

The game got off to a rough start for the Cowboys, with the Tigers scoring on their first possession. Goodland then turned the ball over on their first possession, setting up Ulysses' second touchdown for a score of 12-0 early in the first quarter.

With about four minutes to go in the quarter, Ulysses intercepted the ball and about a minute later scored their third touchdown, 18-0.

The Tigers scored their fourth touchdown with 10:29 to go in the second quarter and missed the two-point conversion, but a Cowboy penalty gave them another chance. Ulysses made it and the score became 26-0.

The Tigers turned the ball over on downs with 7:43 to go in the half, but they intercepted Jared Duke's first

pass, setting up their next touchdown. That made the score 32-0. The Tigers scored one more touchdown in the second quarter, making the score 39-0 at the half.

Ulysses scored its final touchdown of the game with 4:41 to go in the third quarter, making the score 47-0. They got the ball back on an interception but were forced to punt, setting up the Cowboys' first touchdown.

Goodland was on the second down of the play when the quarter ended but kept advancing the ball in the fourth quarter. A leaping, mid-air catch by Andrew Melia set the Cowboys up at first and goal at the seven yard line. The Cowboys struggled on the next two downs but scored their first touchdown on a pass from Duke to Melia on the fourth down.

The Cowboys missed the two-point conversion and the score was 47-6.

The Tigers turned the ball over on an incomplete pass on fourth down with 3:05 to go in the game, and four plays later the Cowboys scored their second touchdown on a pass from Duke to Alan Cebula, making the final score 47-12.

Back-up quarterback gets thirteenth victory

SEATTLE (AP) — Trent Dilfer is making it tough on Mike Holmgren to return him to the bench.

Dilfer, playing for the second straight week in place of Matt Hasselbeck, made it 13 consecutive victories as a starting quarterback as the Seattle Seahawks beat the Denver Broncos 34-21 Sunday.

Holmgren, Seattle's third-year coach, reiterated that he's going back to Hasselbeck when Hasselbeck is completely recovered from a pulled left groin.

Dilfer, the starter for the Baltimore Ravens in their Super Bowl win over the New York Giants in January, had a modest day statistically, but he didn't commit a turnover as the Seahawks (3-2) ended a three-game losing streak

against the Broncos (3-2). Denver had won nine out of 10 against Seattle.

The Seahawks got a 60-yard touchdown run from Shaun Alexander on the sixth play of the game.

They extended the lead with a 55-yard interception return for a touchdown by strong safety Reggie Tongue in the second quarter and got a special-teams touchdown in the third period when Alex Bannister blocked a punt by Tom Rouen and ran 9 yards.

The Seahawks' defense, led by tackle John Randle and linebacker Chad Brown, stymied running back Mike Anderson, who rushed for 195 and 131 yards in victories against Seattle last season. Anderson was held to 51 yards on 17 carries.

Buffaloes gathering steam

Nebraska has some company in the race for the Big 12's North Division title — and for once, it's not Kansas State.

Watch out, the Colorado Buffaloes are gathering steam.

Colorado, 3-8 last year, is tied with Nebraska for the division lead at 3-0 after beating then-No. 25 Texas A&M 31-21 on Saturday. That followed a 16-6 victory over Kansas State, ranked 12th at the time.

And if that's not enough to convince doubters that Gary Barnett is righting the ship in Boulder, the Buffaloes, who jumped to 14th Sunday in The Associated Press poll, will get another chance when they play at No. 9 Texas next Saturday.

"We feel we're very good," CU tailback Cortlen Johnson said. "Lots of people on the outside are not giving us credit, but we believe in ourselves and that's all that counts."

Barnett has believed in his team from the start. He raised some eyebrows in July with his statement that the Buffaloes wouldn't be satisfied unless they played in the Big 12 championship game.

Those words sounded hollow after Colorado stumbled around in a 24-22 loss to Fresno State in the opener. But the Buffaloes (5-1) haven't lost since and are shedding the image that they had become soft.

"This year we've definitely got an attitude that we're not giving up and not giving in," linebacker Kory Mossoni said.

A victory at Texas would — and who would have thought this — keep Colorado in the national championship picture. A loss wouldn't end the Buffaloes' Big 12 title hopes because they still have a Nov. 23 game with No. 3 Nebraska, which is shaping up as the division championship game.

Nebraska stayed unbeaten with a 48-7 thumping of Baylor.

Colorado rallied from a 14-6 deficit to defeat previously unbeaten A&M and made a huge defensive play at the end. The Buffaloes were clinging to a 24-21 lead and A&M (5-1, 2-1) had driven to the CU 35 when Mossoni blindsided quarterback Mark Farris.

The ball popped loose, Joey Johnson picked it up and ran 52 yards for a touchdown with 58 seconds left to secure the victory. It's not the kind of game Colorado would have won last year.

"I'm really proud of their character," Barnett said. "They just wouldn't let it go. They encourage each other all the time. They play off each other and use each other's energy. It's fun to watch these guys play."

Nebraska (7-0 overall) pounded Baylor (2-3, 0-3) with 641 yards rushing. The Cornhuskers tied an NCAA record with four backs topping the 100-yard mark, led by Thunder Collins with 165.

Coach Frank Solich's comment? "We had hoped to pass more," he said — evidently in all seriousness.

And what of Kansas State, which has been Nebraska's main challenger for North supremacy since the Big 12 was formed? Try 0-3 in the league.

Texas Tech (3-2, 1-2) beat the Wildcats 38-19, leaving Kansas State (2-3) with its first three-game losing streak since 1992. It's the first time K-State has been under .500 after five games since 1989, Bill Snyder's first season as coach.

"A lot of things have to happen for us to get back on track," said Snyder, whose team won't have it any easier when A&M visits next Saturday.

Kliff Kingsbury, knocked out of the game in a loss to Kansas a week ago, rattled Kansas State for 409 yards passing and four TDs.

Iowa State (4-1, 2-1) is a game behind the leaders in the North after a 20-14 victory at Missouri. A young defense that was supposed to be the Cyclones' weakness stopped Missouri (2-3, 1-2) on four plays inside the 10 at the end.

No. 2 Oklahoma (6-0, 3-0) remains in control in the South and has one more game before its Oct. 27 trip to Nebraska, a possible preview of the conference championship game. The Sooners beat Kansas (2-3, 1-2) 38-10 and should have no trouble with Baylor next Saturday.

Texas (5-1, 2-1) got back on track after its loss to Oklahoma a week earlier, rolling to a 45-17 victory over Oklahoma State (2-4, 0-3) behind Chris Simms' five touchdown passes.

"We needed this real bad," Simms said.

Still, the Longhorns face an uphill climb as they get ready for Saturday's visit by Colorado. Oklahoma would have to lose twice to give Texas a chance of winning the South.

Steelers beat Chiefs

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — The Bus wasn't alone in carrying the Pittsburgh Steelers into first place in the AFC Central.

Jerome Bettis ran for 112 yards on 19 carries, and Kordell Stewart threw for 141 yards and a touchdown as the Steelers beat the Kansas City Chiefs 20-17 on Sunday.

Bettis had his fifth 100-yard game in six trips to Arrowhead Stadium, and had several other big gains nullified by holding penalties. All but 24 of Bettis' yards came in the second half.

"Once we started really hitting them, you could feel their energy disappearing," Bettis said. "We were able to take advantage of that."

The Steelers (3-1) were helped by a solid defensive performance and a pair of field goals by Kris Brown.

The Steelers' Chad Scott returned an interception 61 yards for a touchdown, his first in four-plus seasons in the NFL.

Brown kicked to second-quarter field goals, including a 55-yarder into the wind that matched the Steelers' record set by Gary Anderson in 1984.


Stewart completed 15 of 25 passes, including a 5-yard touchdown pass to Hines Ward late in the third quarter that pushed Pittsburgh's lead to 20-2.

The Chiefs lost their third straight home game and fell to 1-4 for the first time since 1988.

Priest Holmes led Kansas City with 150 yards on 20 carries.
