Powell won't run for attorney general; Kline considering campaign for office

Rep. Tony Powell, of Wichita, announced Thursday he would not seek the Republican nomination for attorney general. He also said he will not seek re-election to the Kansas House.

Powell's decision immediately created speculation that former state Rep. eral. Kline said he would announce a decision within two weeks.
