As we watch the new surrounding the anthrax-related death this month in Florida I saw the following new release of questions and answers on the subject by Kansas State University veterinarian George Kennedy. Kennedy is the director of the Kansas State Veterinary Diagnostic Laboratory and I thought his discussion would help people better under-

What is anthrax?

stand the disease.

Anthrax is a bacterial disease caused by a bacteria called Bacillus anthracis. The organism can occur in nature as either spores or vegetative organisms. The spore form is very resistant and can remain viable within soil for many years. How is it transmitted?

Anthrax can be transmitted by contamination of open sores on skin, by inhalation of the spores, and by ingestion.

Herbivorous animals get it by ingesting the spores while grazing. Who is vulnerable to anthrax? Virtually all warm-blooded animals are susceptible, but some species are more susceptible than others. Cattle, sheep and goats are very susceptible. Horses, pigs, and carnivores are somewhat less susceptible. People can get anthrax, but uncommonly. Depending on the form of the disease in people, it can either be very acute and highly fatal or more chronic and much less serious,

What are some key things people should know about anthrax?

particularly if treated early with antibi-

otics.

The important thing for people to know is this is a very uncommon disease, even rare or non-existent in many parts of the country and that it is not readily transmitted from animals to people, and particularly, it is not transmitted from person to person. There is no danger in being around or caring for a person that has or potentially has anthrax. In a terrorist attack using anthrax, the spores would be aerosolized and inhaled and could cause many deaths, but the disease would not be transmitted from person to person after the original attack of aerosolized spores or organisms.

How often does it occur in Kansas?

Laboratory will diagnose an occasional case, perhaps once every couple of years although they have never diagnosed it in animals other than cattle. When it occurs, it is usually suspected by the local veterinarian and then specimens are submitted to the diagnostic lab for confirmation. Most cases seem to occur in the Northwest part of the state. There are other areas around the country and the world where it tends to be more common than in other areas.

These are called endemic areas. But even in these endemic areas, the disease might go years without occurring and then there may be an outbreak following something like a flood or drought and high winds that would stir up the dirt and expose the buried spores.

Construction for new buildings where the soil is disturbed can also start outbreaks in endemic areas.

How is anthrax transmitted from livestock to people?

It can be transmitted by contaminated fluids or tissues contacting open wounds. It can also be transmitted from animals to people by ingesting contaminated meat from an infected animal, but this is rare. Contaminated objects or products from animals such as hides, wool, and bone meal can also be sources of infection for people.

There have been cases where contaminated bristles on shaving brushes caused the disease in people. Biting insects are also a potential transmitter. Not because the insects get the disease, but just by carrying contaminated blood or fluids from an animal dead from the disease to the open wound of a person. The pulmonary form in people is rarely, if ever, the result of transmission from infected animals, but usually from air-

borne particles such as from contaminated dust or airborne particles from other sources. People do not contract the disease from other

people and there is minimal danger from caring for or being around people ill with anthrax. The most common form in people is the cutaneous form, where an open wound has been contaminated. This forms chronic festering sores or pustules.

What can people do to protect themselves?

The best protection is simply good hygiene. Being careful around sick animals, particularly in endemic areas or where previous cases in animals have occurred. One should always bury or burn animals dead from suspected anthrax. If veterinarians suspect an animal to have anthrax, they usually will not autopsy the animal, but rather take a specimen of blood to send into a laboratory for confirmation. This is an attempt to minimize contamination of the soil.

What can people do to protect their livestock?

Again, good hygiene and seeking veterinary assistance to diagnose dead or dying livestock. There is a vaccine available, but it is not recommended unless an outbreak is occurring. In some states, such as Kansas where the disease is rare. a livestock producer has to have permission from the Livestock Commissioner to vaccinate his or her animals. This is because the vaccine itself is composed of a live, but weakened anthrax organism, but it can still potentially contaminate the soil.

How is it treated?

If diagnosed early, a number of different antibiotics will kill the organism. In the pulmonary form, it is treatable in the early stages, but once the bacteria have become disseminated in the body and there has been extensive damage in the lungs, antibiotic treatment is usually futile.
