

It's a 'Dawg eat 'Dawg world

The annual meeting of the Bulldogs ended with Golden Plains High School winning over Brewster 44-16 in Rexford on Friday night.

Brewster's first possession started with two fumbles and an incomplete pass, giving Golden Plains the ball on their own 38. They took four plays and 51 seconds to make the score 8-0 Golden Plains on a 3-yard run by Lee Albers on first and goal.

Brewster's defense held Golden Plains in check the rest of the first quarter. A fumble by the Brewster offense was recovered by Landon Truetken and run in six yards for Golden Plains other score in the quarter.

Brewster's Jacob Falcon found J.R. Baird open on third and 10 at the Brewster 26 and Baird outraced his pursuit for the first Brewster score. The 2-point attempt was good and the score was 16-8, where it remained until half-time.

Another quick Golden Plains score at the beginning of the second half made the score 24-8 and the Golden Plains defense scored another touchdown off an interception by Matt Giesenhagen for a 30-8 score at the end of three.

Brewster came back on their first drive of the fourth with a Falcon pass to Jake Long. The 2-point was good and the score was 30-16.

With 6:09 left in the game, Golden Plains took over on downs, and drove 50 yards for a touchdown by Austin Spresser at the 4:09 mark with a successful 2-point conversion, making the score 38-16.

The last score of the game came on a 10-yard Albers run with four seconds left. The 2-point failed and the game ended 44-16.

Golden Plains goes to Weskan Thursday afternoon for the final game of their season at 3:30 p.m. Central Time.

Brewster finishes their season at home, hosting the Cheylin Cougars at 7:30 p.m. Central Time.

Brady Dible went 1-for-5 for 16 yards and Jesse Miller went 1-for-1 for eight. Casey Shaw caught Dible's pass and Dible caught Miller's.

Albers had 28 carries for 242 yards and two touchdowns and Spresser had 11 carries, 62 yards and two touchdowns.

Spresser led the defense with 17 tackles, Jesse Miller had 12, Albers had 10, Adam Thompson had 10 and Casey Shaw had seven.

Truetken had a six yard fumble recovery for a touchdown and Giesenhagen had a 23 yard interception for a touchdown.

Baird had 22 tackles, Falcon 15, Long 11, Swanson 10, Dixon had nine, Luckert and Jesse Crumrine 8, Josh Ryan four and Tyler Johnson two.

Bonds player of year

ST. LOUIS (AP) — Home run king Barry Bonds of the San Francisco Giants has been named player of the year by The Sporting News, the publication announced Tuesday.

It marked the second time Bonds won the award. He also won in 1990 while playing for the Pittsburgh Pirates.

"It's a tremendous award, and it's very much appreciated because all the players voted for it," Bonds said. "I'm honored."

Bonds hit a record 73 homers in 2001, topping Mark McGwire's three-year-old record of 70. Bonds also set records for slugging percentage (.863) and walks (177). Both records were previously held by Babe Ruth.

Inviting by major league players, Bonds received 133 votes to finish well ahead of runner-up Sammy Sosa of the Chicago Cubs, who received 57. Arizona's Luis Gonzalez was third with 48.

The Sporting News also announced several other baseball awards.

Managers of the year were Seattle's Lou Piniella in the American League and Philadelphia's Larry Bowa in the National League. Piniella guided the Mariners to a record-tying 116 wins, though they lost to the New York Yankees in the ALCS. Bowa's Phillies finished second in the NL East.

Pitchers of the year were Roger Clemens of the Yankees and Curt Schilling of the Diamondbacks. Firemen of the year (combined wins and saves) were Mariano Rivera of the Yankees and a tie between Robb Nen of San Francisco and Armando Benitez of the New York Mets.

Rookies of the year were Seattle's Ichiro Suzuki and Albert Pujols of the St. Louis Cardinals. Rookie pitcher award winners were Cleveland's C.C. Sabathia and Houston's Roy Oswalt.

Comeback players of the year were Ruben Sierra of the Texas Rangers and Matt Morris of St. Louis.

Chiefs, plagued by injuries, have only one win in six games

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — The Kansas City Chiefs' list of injuries benefits a team that's won only once in six games.

Already with a big hole in the offensive line when tackle Victor Riley went out last week, the Chiefs were dealing with another blow Tuesday when defensive tackle John Browning was pronounced lost with a knee injury.

Also out is their best defensive back, Ray Crockett, and top kick returner, Dante Hall.

Coach Dick Vermeil said he was "99

percent sure" Browning was gone for the year. In his place will be Nate Hobgood-Chittick, a fourth-year man from North Carolina who will make his first start Thursday night against Indianapolis.

"Nate played pretty well last week," Vermeil said. "He's very active. He's a guy who finishes every snap and he gets into plays sometimes just on his effort."

The Chiefs will probably declare Browning out for the year and bring in another defensive lineman.

"We'll bring in somebody and work

with him for a while," Vermeil said. "I have a kid in mind right now."

Hall was given a long look at practice on Tuesday.

"I'm not 100 percent sure he'll be active or not," Vermeil said. "I don't want to get him going too soon and then re-injure the shoulder. He's probably 50-50."

Hobgood-Chittick will rotate with others.

"We'd like to ask him to play 40 snaps," Vermeil said.

Browning, who rarely has much to

say, had been playing well before hurting his knee in last week's 24-16 loss at Arizona.

"John Browning gets it done by example," said Hobgood-Chittick.

"You hate to start because of something like that. I'm not looking at this as different from any other week. I just get to go out there first."

Vermeil was hopeful of getting Hall back. The kick return specialist has been out for three weeks with a shoulder injury.

The Chiefs (1-5) will be hosting the

Colts (2-3) in a game that was moved to Thursday night to avoid any possible conflict with the World Series in a Sunday night game.
