The Wildcats' 40-6 victory over their offensively inept state rivals on Saturday did more than snap a four-game losing skid. It also got a group of players who have grown accustomed to success back in business.

"This may not be the Kansas State team of old," said Wildcat linebacker Ben Leber. "But we're getting back. This doesn't turn things around 180 degrees. But it's a start. We'll see how everyone responds."

Kansas State (3-4, 1-4 Big 12) went right to work stopping its longest losing streak since Bill Snyder's first year as head coach in 1989. Josh Scobey, with a smart start to a 204-yard day, broke free for 45 yards on the very first play from scrimmage.

From that point on, it was all downhill for Kansas (2-5, 1-4).

Actually, Kansas' downfall began even sooner. When one of the Jayhawks' captains became confused on which option to choose after the coin flip, Kansas State wound up getting the ball at the beginning of both the first and second half.

"That's something we definitely have to take advantage of," said quarterback Marc Dunn. "And I think we did for the most part. Coming out in the first drive basically set the tempo for the game and we were off and running from there."

The Jayhawks, falling to 0-5 against Kansas State in Terry Allen's tenure, managed only two field goals. In the past two weeks, they've lost to archrivals Missouri and Kansas State.

"We are heart-broken," said Kansas linebacker Leo Etienne. "We just lost two rival games and anybody will be heart-broken when they lose two rival games. The season is not over yet. We just have to finish strong.'

In the final minutes, the crowd of more than 50,000 began chanting, "Nine in a row! Nine in a row!"

"We're not worried about that," said Etienne. "What has happened, has hapened. It won't be 10.

Turnovers give win to Denver

DENVER (AP) — After 162 career passes without an interception, Tom Brady sure fell apart in a hurry.

Brady, a model of accuracy in four previous starts, threw four fourth-quarter interceptions and the Denver Broncos took advantage in a 31-20 victory Sunday over the New England Patriots.

Denard Walker and Deltha O'Neal each had two interceptions, and Rod Smith had six catches for 159 yards and a touchdown to help the Broncos (4-3) beat New England (3-4) for the 12th time in 14 games since 1984.

"Their defensive backs are like receivers out there," Brady said. "If you throw it their way, they're probably going to catch it.'

Brady, a second-year player filling in for the injured Drew Bledsoe, had the best interception-free streak to start an NFL career, but he threw four in 10 attempts in the game's final 15 minutes.

Walker started the turnover trend when he intercepted a pass in the back of the end zone to protect a 24-20 lead, and O'Neal made a diving grab five minutes later. Walker provided the clinching score when he returned an interception 39 yards with 2:24 remaining.

On the play, New England receiver Troy Brown ran his pattern to the inside, and Brady threw the ball directly to Walker on the outside.
