# **Coach needed** win to save job

Associated Press Writer Terry Allen knew before kickoff what it would take to save his job at Kansas. It might have been the toughest task he faced as the Jayhawks' coach: a win against undefeated No. 2 Nebraska

Interim coach Tom Hayes said Monday that Allen told his staff before Saturday's game, which ended up a 51-7 loss at home in front of a Nebraskafriendly crowd, he would be dismissed if Kansas (2-6, 1-5 Big 12) lost.

"It was based on losing the game," Hayes said during the Big 12's weekly coaches teleconference. "If we had won the game, it would not have happened. We still had the opportunity to be bowl eligible had we won the game.'
