Emma Anna Peter

Former Sherman County and St. Francis resident Emma Anna Peter, 88, died Monday, Oct. 29, 2001, in Denver. She was born on Feb. 1, 1913, in

Phillips County, the youngest of 10 children of Louise and Alvina Johanna Swantusch Eikenberg. She was baptized April 20, 1913, at the Pleasant Green Lutheran Church, which her father had helped build.

When she was 3, the family moved to a farm near Otis. Colo., where she attended a rural school through the eighth grade. After her father died, the family moved into Otis where they lived with a sister, Elsie (Walter) Bade.

Her niece, Mary Klinzmann of Haigler, and her fiancé Ed Odenbach, were friends of a young man from St. Francis, named Emil Peter. They arranged a blind date for Emma. They were married at the Bade home in Otis on May 17, 1931.

She and her husband enjoyed traveling. They had lived at Holly Heights Care Center in Denver for a little more than a year, marking their 70th wedding anniversary in May.

She was active in the County Line Hustlers Club in Sherman County, the Evangelical United Brethren Church in St. Francis, which later joined the United Methodist Church, and the women's organizations of both churches, as well as Cheyenne County Hospital Guild.

Services were Friday, Nov. 2, at the St. Francis United Methodist Church, with the Rev. Dennis Livingston officiating. Burial was in the St. Francis Cemetery.

She is survived by her husband, Emil: two sons, Willard of St. Francis and Dallas of Aurora, Colo.; two daughters, Lavonne (Delmer) Zweygardt of Parker, Colo., and Sherry (Eddy) Schultz of St. Francis; daughter-in-law Arlene Peter, a sister, Martha Lueschen, and two sisters-inlaw, Mildred Burr and Helen Peter, all of St. Francis; 11 grandchildren; 18 great grandchildren; and 4 step-greatgreat grandchildren.

Working cattle quietly subject of Cheyenne Wells tour

Are you a ranch wife or ranch hand who dreads cattle working days? Branding, vaccinating, weaning, shipping and preg checking are commonly high stress events for both animals and people. But they don't have to be.

Dr. Temple Grandin, a livestock handling and facilities consultant, will speak at the Community Building on the fairgrounds in Cheyenne Wells, Colo., on Tuesday, Nov. 27. Registration with rolls and coffee will begin at 8:30 a.m. and the workshop will run from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Dr. Grandin is known throughout the world for her unique ability to see things as animals do. She described this in her book, "Thinking in Pictures and Other Reports from My Life with Autism." She says she sees the details first and then the general picture. She notices high contrasts of light and dark and sees movement, just as livestock do. She is not locked into verbal thinking as most people are.

tices and facilities less stressful, from efit. Make sure you, your spouse, cothe ranch to the slaughterhouse. Her facilities work so well, almost half of the cattle in North America are handled in her restrainer system for meat plants. Through her work, she has learned how to move livestock with minimal stress or risk of injury to either animal or handler. The cornerstones of her livestock movement rules are the "flight zone" and "point of balance" These rules work with all herding animals. Hotshots, yelling, kicking or slapping the animals are definitely not part of Dr. Grandin's techniques.

Dr. Grandin will use the morning portion of the workshop to discuss the principles of livestock behavior, how and what livestock see, moving cattle in large and small areas and corral design.

After lunch on your own, the group will visit a working ranch where you'll watch yearling cattle being preg checked. Dr. Grandin will give her insights as to how to make the ranch and its cattle handling techniques better.
