all Scouts earn the badge.

"It'll be a relief to finally have it," Max Saint said, noting that he and Russell have been working to become Eagle Scouts most of their lives.

As final projects, Saint built a picnic shelter at Smoky Gardens Memorial Park south of Goodland and Russell a memorial to unborn children at the Goodland Cemetery.

Russell said he worked for about three months planning, raising money and installing the memorial, which features an engraved stone and a granite bench set on a concrete base shaped like a cross. He said he raised about \$3,000 for the project, which was unveiled in mid-July.

Russell said people have responded well to the memorial, honoring all babies who died before they were born.

"They've said that it is a good addition to the community," he said.

Saint said he spent most of the summer gathering materials and labor for the picnic shelter, which he, his father Dennis and other volunteers spent three days building in July. He said the Sherman County Commission approved the project and the Smoky Gardens board footed the \$1,500 bill for Saint said people like the new shel-

"Everyone tells me we did a good job," he said.

The Scouts said becoming an Eagle Scout will help them qualify for college scholarships and eventually find jobs. Russell said he plans to go to the Air Force Academy next year and Saint said he is enrolled in the communications technology program at the Northwest Kansas Technical College.

More importantly, they said, the badges will earn them respect and inspire other Scouts.

"Younger Scouts will look up to us more," Saint said. "It really inspires the little ones to work harder when they see us accomplish this."

Three other Goodland Scouts have earned an Eagle Scout badge in the past two years, Russell said, but before that it had been 10 to 15 years.

Saint said when they became Scouts, the program was weak, but his father volunteered to be Scoutmaster and began recruiting members.

"He got a lot of kids to join the troop," Saint said, noting that the program grew stronger as Scouts began earning their Eagle Scout badges. He said a couple more Goodland Scouts plan to earn the badges in the next few

NEW YORK (AP) — Barry Bonds became the first player to win four with 137 RBIs for the San Francisco Most Valuable Player Awards.

Bonds won the National League MVP in a landslide to cap a recordbreaking season in which his 73 home runs broke baseball's biggest season record. He received 30 of 32 first-place ballots and 438 points in voting by the Baseball Writers' Association of

The 37-year-old outfielder hit .328 Giants. Chicago Cubs outfielder Sammy Sosa got the other two firstplace votes and finished second with 278 points.

Bonds also won the MVP award for Pittsburgh in 1990 and 1992 and for the Giants in 1993. He finished second to Atlanta's Terry Pendleton in 1991 and to San Francisco's Jeff Kent last year.


