

Assistant takes over

Randy Bahe, a Sherman County farmer who has been assistant coach of the Goodland High School wrestling team for seven years, is taking over as head coach this season, replacing Chris Guillot.

Guillot, who was a physical education teacher at the high school, resigned at the end of last school year. Bahe said he moved to Tulsa, where he took a sales job.
Bahe, who coached the Kansas Kids' Wrestling team for 13 years before shifting to the high school, said Guillot knew he was going to quit last spring and asked him about taking over.
After the coach resigned, he said, Principal Harvey Swager called to offer him the job.
"I decided I'd try my hand at it," he said. Bahe said he grew up in Goodland and wrestled in high school under Coach Rocky Welton. He said he thinks Welton, who has since retired and moved to Garden City, was one of the best coaches in Kansas.
"He instilled a love for the sport in me," he said. "I hope to pattern my coaching after my experiences with Coach Welton."
Bahe said the students had a deep

respect for Welton.
"Because of the way he treated the kids," he said, "they gave 110 percent."
The new coach said he hopes the athletes will do the same for him.
"I'm hoping for a successful, enjoyable season," he said, noting that success is in the eye of the beholder.
"In reality," he said, "I certainly think we can place in the top six in the state."
The Cowboys took first in state competition in 2000 and finished in eighth place last season. State qualifiers returning this season are Blayze Bahe, a sophomore; Kyle Schulte, a junior; and Bryce Bahe and Max Saint, both seniors. Blayze and Bryce are Randy Bahe's sons.
Bahe said 41 wrestlers came out this season, with nine to 11 in each class. Since the team began practice on Monday, Nov. 12, he said, the returning seniors have shown they will be good leaders.
"That senior class is doing a really good job," he said. "We had a great first week of practice. The team works well together and the athletes have good work ethics. I have no complaints about practice."
Bahe will see how the team handles the real thing when the varsity Cow-

boys travel to St. Francis on Saturday, Dec. 1, for an annual tournament, which typically starts Goodland's season. The junior varsity wrestlers will stay at home that day for a tournament at Max Jones Fieldhouse.
The coach said he hopes the team performs well in St. Francis, which is usually a tough meet.
"There's always plenty of good wrestlers there," he said. "It's a good way to open the year."
In practice, Bahe said, he stresses take downs because that most often is what sets the tone of a match. He said he expects this year's wrestlers to perform well on the mat.
Returning varsity wrestlers include Taylor Brack, L.J. VonLintel, Chris Zimmerman, Jordan Bedore, Thomas Tompkins and Brandon Nemechek.
Bahe's assistants are Travis Palmgren, a Sherman County farmer and former Goodland wrestler, and Bill Gabel, a St. Francis native who replaced Guillot as physical education teacher.
Gabel, a St. Francis native, is the son of St. Francis wrestling coach Larry Gabel. He was a four-time state champion wrestler at St. Francis High and his father is one of the state's most successful wrestling coaches.

Jayhawks lack fans at finale

LAWRENCE (AP) — How bad was attendance at the Wyoming-Kansas game?
Not even the band showed up.
Most band members had made plans to be away for the Thanksgiving weekend. And when the game was re-scheduled from September, they ignored the school's request to stick around.
So local high school band members were cobbled together with the few university musicians still in town to play a few tunes for the crowd of about 6,500 who braved the rain, the cold, the wind and the sight of two 2-8 teams.
"I want to thank the people that came out and supported us through these bad times," senior defensive back Andrew Davison said after the Jayhawks brought an end to their season with a 27-14 victory.
"And for the people that didn't, maybe next year we'll give them something to come out and look at."

Next for the Jayhawks will be athletic director Al Bohl's choice for a coach to replace Terry Allen, who was fired with three games left in his fifth year. Interim coach Tom Hayes refused to talk about his candidacy but he is the only potential hire that Bohl has been willing to identify publicly.
Hayes, 51, a career assistant coach, was in no mood to discuss the possibility after the Jayhawks broke a six-game losing streak and handed the Cowboys (2-9) their eighth straight loss.
"I'm not going to get into that right now," he said. "It's not the time. I want to talk about these players and what they did today."

Quarterback shows worth in Chiefs' victory

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — Trent Green finally showed fans why Dick Vermeil was willing to trade a first-round draft pick to bring him to Kansas City.
Green and the Chiefs put together their first complete game at Arrowhead Stadium, snapping a five-game home losing streak with a 19-7 victory over

the Seattle Seahawks on Sunday.
"When the running game and the passing game can work together, that's when you're most effective as an offense," Green said.
Green was 16-for-26 for 256 yards and no interceptions. He had thrown a league-worst 16 in the Chiefs' first nine games.

Priest Holmes played a big role for Kansas City's offense, running for 120 yards and catching three passes for 70 yards. His receptions included a 55-yarder, with most of that yardage coming after the catch, that set up Mike Cloud's game-winning 15-yard touchdown run in the fourth quarter.
"We've just got to keep him going," Green said. "He's running the ball well, and his yards after the catch have really helped the passing game a lot."
The Chiefs' defense, meanwhile, kept one of the NFL's leading rushers in check and blitzed enough to keep

quarterback Matt Hasselbeck from settling into a passing rhythm.
"They put 12 guys up on the line, it seemed like," Seahawks running back Shaun Alexander said.
Alexander, fourth in rushing with 851 yards before the game, was limited to 43 yards on 13 carries.
Alexander led the Seahawks with six catches for 62 yards, including a 28-yard TD catch that cut Kansas City's lead to 10-7 late in the second quarter.
Seattle (5-5) had a two-game winning streak snapped and lost at Arrowhead for the 10th time in last 12 games.

"We needed this game," Seattle's Chad Eaton said. "We know our record down here. We know we haven't won here in a long time. We really needed this one bad."
The Chiefs (3-7) needed the game, too. The announced attendance was 77,357, but there were a few thousand empty seats at the kickoff and the stadium was about half-full at game's end.
"Even though it wasn't the feeling I expected with a full house and everything, it still felt good," cornerback Ray Crockett said. "It's special to get that first one in."

Wildcats looking to play in bowl


MANHATTAN (AP) — They'll probably play in December, on cable, in someplace like Houston or Tucson, Ariz., or Shreveport, La.
Or maybe the call won't come — although that's unlikely, given Kansas State fans' reputation for "traveling well."
But after struggling through a four-game losing streak earlier this season, the Wildcats are just glad to be bowl-eligible for a ninth straight season after beating Missouri 24-3 on Saturday.
"In the middle of the season, we were down and a lot of people were counting us out," said Kansas State running back Josh Scobey, who ran for 198

yards and two touchdowns, broke two school records and tied another on Saturday. "But this is a team that has a lot of heart and toughness. We knew we were going to fight and get back in it, and we did."
Kansas State (6-5, 3-5 Big 12 Conference) won four of its last five games and is under consideration by the Inde-

pendence, Insight.com and Gallery-furniture.com bowls. Representatives of the first two attended Saturday's game but said no announcement was planned before this weekend's Big 12 title game.
Scobey's 1,263 yards this season broke Isaac Jackson's record of 1,137, set in 1973.


