Richard Bouziden, presiding overseer of the Goodland congregation, said there were 1,013 delegates at the assembly.

# Utility helps with bills

UtiliCorp United, parent company of People’s Natural Gas and WestPlains Energy, is matching customer and employee contributions to its EnergyOne Cares program through the end of the year.

The program provides energy assistance for low-income people through agencies in areas where customers make donations, said Larissa Long, community relations director for UtiliCorp in Kansas.

“Many of our lower income customers are still having difficulty paying their past due energy bills,” said Long. “(We) want to increase our assistance to persons with very limited incomes.”

In Kansas, she said, EnergyOne Cares funds are contributed to HeatShare, administered by the Salvation Army.

People’s and WestPlains Energy are waiving the standard deposit and reconnection charges when a bill is paid in full for customers whose service had been disconnected for non-payment.

“We urge customers who are behind on their energy bills to contact us to make payment arrangements,” said Long. “We want to make every effort to set up payment agreement which will keep energy service intact....”
