### Senator becomes fifth president

By Associated Press **INTERNATIONAL** 

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina — A eft-wing senator became Argentina's fifth president in two weeks, pledging to ditch free-market policies that he said had left Argentina "without a peso."Thousands of protesters banged pots in the streets early today to demand a popular election.

Eduardo Duhalde, a 60-year-old former vice president and two-term governor of the country's richest province, Buenos Aires, was chosen to serve out the term of his unpopular predecessor, Fernando de la Rua, through December 2003. His election was confirmed by 262

lawmakers with 21 against in a marathon session of Congress late Tuesday. The legislators also scuttled earlier plans for a March presidential election, sparking a large but peaceful street protest early today.

Now confronting the country's most serious political and economic crisis in decades, the new president from Argentina's largest party lashed out at free market policies he blames for the country's economic woes.

SYDNEY, Australia — Hot, dry and swirling winds fanned more than 100 bush fires out of control and smoke clouds towered over Australia's largest city today as angry officials vowed to punish arsonists, many of them chil-

dren. At least half of the wildfires have been deliberately lit since the crisis started 10 days ago near Sydney, population 4 million, police said.

Thousands of residents fled their homes as separate blazes joined and formed several massive fire fronts that totaled about 1,200 miles in length and came as close as 11 miles to downtown Sydney. About 20,000 firefighters were stretched to their limit by the wild

Hundreds of reinforcements were being flown in from other Australian states and neighboring New Zealand.

At least 21 arson suspects, including 14 children, have been arrested and police were searching for others. The seven adult suspects face a maximum penalty of 14 years in prison if con-

Police said there was no apparent motive for the adults to set the fires. The younger suspects, one of them only 9, appeared to be mischief makers bored during the summer school vacation.

ALEXANDRIA, Va. — Zacarias Moussaoui, the first individual charged as an accomplice in the Sept. 11 attacks, has decided to plead inno-

maim thousands of victims, his lawyer

"We will be entering a plea of not guilty to all of the charges in the indictment," public defender Frank Dunham, one of three defense attorneys, said prior to Moussaoui's arraignment today in U.S. District Court.

Four charges in the six-count indictment could result in Moussaoui's execution, if he were convicted, and U.S. District Judge Leonie Brinkema set a March 29 deadline for prosecutors to decide whether they would seek the death penalty.

Moussaoui's mother, Aicha el-Wafi, came to the United States from France last week and said her son told her he could prove his innocence. The defendant, 33, is a French citizen of Moroccan descent who received a master's degree in England.

Although Moussaoui has been in federal custody on immigration charges since August, when he aroused suspicions at a Minnesota flight school, the indictment says he conspired with the Sept. 11 hijackers to kill and maim victims in the United States.
