# Chiefs manage to win despite high turnovers

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — The the players. Kansas City Chiefs seem bent on disproving a time-honored football belief, have been defying the odds, Vermeil that teams with the fewest turnovers usually win.

They were minus-two in turnover margin against both Denver on Dec. 16 and San Diego on Dec. 23. But each time, they found a way to come out ahead.

On Sunday at Jacksonville, while going minus-one in the turnover department, they downed the Jaguars 30-26, making it three wins in a row despite lagging in the supposedly telling turnover category.

"We're living on the edge," said coach Dick Vermeil. "We've defied the odds in every way possible.'

The Chiefs' wildest statistical oddity fell on the other side of the turnover theory.

At Oakland just before their current three-game streak, they recovered four fumbles

They also made one interception while giving up just one interception of their own.

But, making Vermeil want to tear his hair out, they still were beaten 28-26. "Before that game, teams with a

plus-four turnover ratio this year were 23-0," Vermeil said.

He added, "Since 1990, it's a 92 percent chance that you win. You have an 8 percent chance of losing that football game and we did it."

Worried that his team had been losing the turnover battle, Vermeil made sure to raise the subject in team meetings while getting ready for Jacksonville.

He could have saved his breath.

"When (the Jaguars) were even or minus in turnovers, they lost seven and body else in the AFC," Vermeil said. national championship. won one going into our game," he told

Despite the way the Chiefs (6-9) will be sure to keep hammering home the same point.

"You've got to know the history of the turnover factor," he said. "You're far better off staying with the history and preaching it and selling it rather than living on the edge.

"And we're living on the edge right now," he added.

A main reason the Chiefs have beaten the odds has been the greatly improved play of quarterback Trent Green. In the first half of the season, he had the most interceptions and one of the lowest ratings of anyone in the entire league.

"In the (last) three games, he was 74.8 percent complete," Vermeil said. 'He's played well. He was 15-of-17 in the second half (at Jacksonville). He's really come on of late."

With a victory in their season finale at Seattle on Sunday, the Chiefs would close the season on a four-game winning streak and with a 7-9 record, an impressive turnaround from their 1-6 start in Vermeil's first year as head coach.

"I was really proud of the way we went down there and played in what a lot of people would label a nothing game," Vermeil said of the Jacksonville game.

A 7-9 record would also match Kansas City's worst season since Carl Peterson took over as general manager in 1989.

It would mean the Chiefs closed the season 6-3.

# Colorado Buffs fall short of expectations

TEMPE, Ariz. (AP) — Bidding to coach Gary Barnett said. become the first team in history to defeat three Top 3 teams in successive games, Colorado fell short.

Mistakes, missed opportunities, poor tackling and an inability to stop Oregon quarterback Joey Harrington doomed the No. 3 Buffaloes to a 38-16 blowout loss in the Fiesta Bowl.

The Buffs, who entered Tuesday's game on a roll following wins over then-No. 2 Nebraska and then-No. 3 Texas, had no answer for No. 2 Oregon.

"They just stopped the run, stopped our whole offense entirely," Colorado wide receiver and kick returner Roman Hollowell said.

The momentum turned when Colorado twice failed on third-and-1 running plays early in the second quarter, one of them at the Oregon 39.

"I think the critical plays for us were the two third-down conversions that we didn't convert," Barnett said. "An offense that has run the ball as effectively as we have through the course of the year, for us to get to those two situations and not convert probably took a little wind out of our sails."
